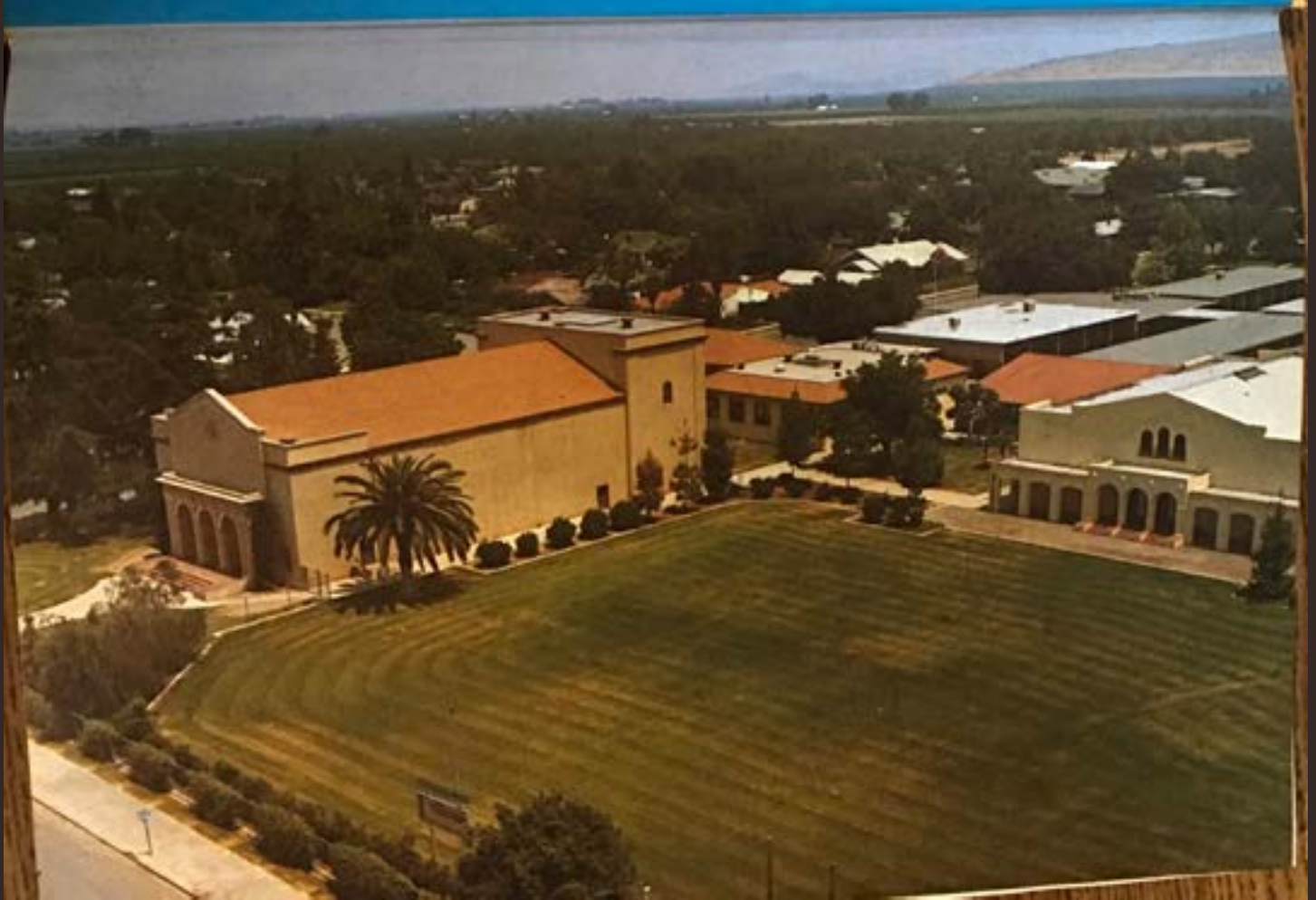
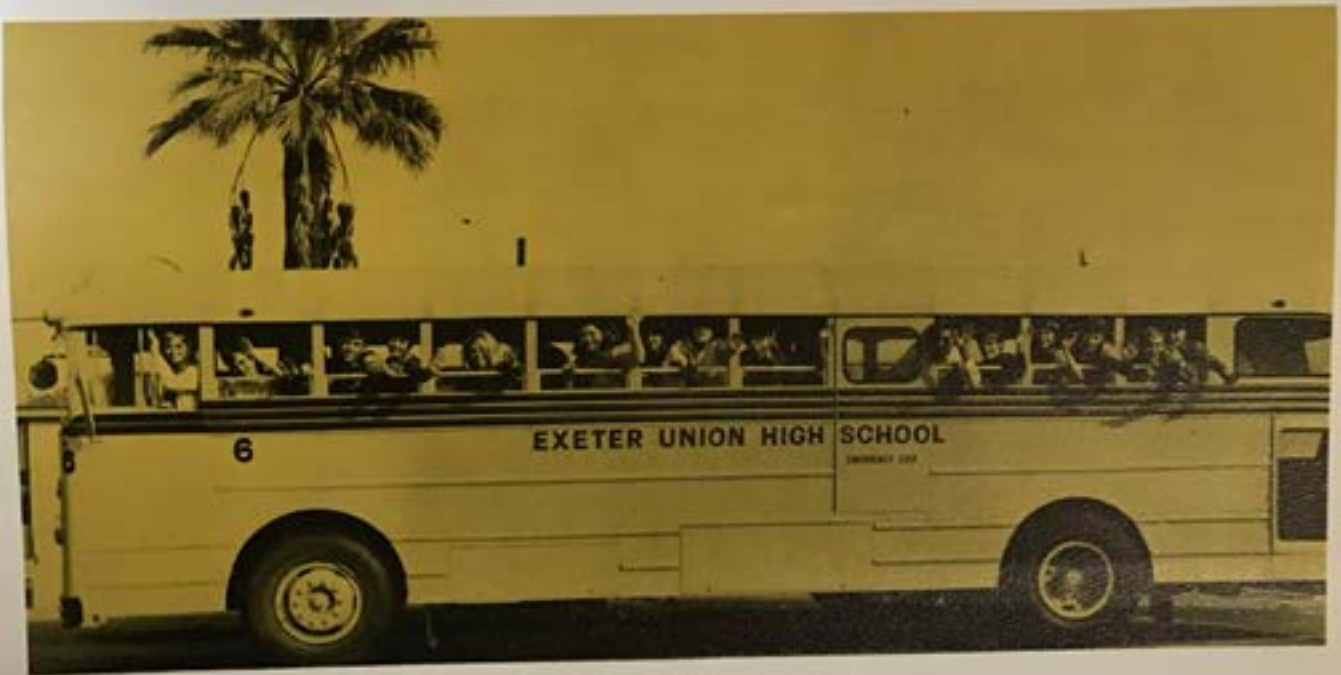

## Varsity Captures Co-Championship in West Sequoia League

After a rocky start, which resulted in two losses and a tie, we bounced back to win six straight and made one of the best showings in league play Exeter fans have witnessed in many years.

Chaos at our first game but we were plagued with bad breaks and miscues and came up on the short end 12-7. For our second game we journeyed to Lindby. Both teams put up such an outstanding defensive battle. The game ended 0-0.

On the road again we traveled to our old rival Woodlake. We started the game with a touchdown and came inches short of another, but the roof then fell in as injuries resulted a 29-12 disaster.

Still looking for our first win we hunted the heavily favored Redwood team. We showed much improvement over the Woodlake game and came up with an impressive 26-18 win. Next week we completed the "Visalia Sweep" by stopping Mt. Whitney by the narrow margin of 15-6.

Our league play opened with the Varsity traveling to meet the scrappy Fowler Redcats. We squeaked by 27-25, in a close offensive battle that produced three Exeter touchdowns in the first half and one in the second. The fact that we had more Exeter fans with us than the home team could produce, probably made the difference between victory and defeat.

They are all ready and waiting for their next year at Exeter High after working hard during their first one.

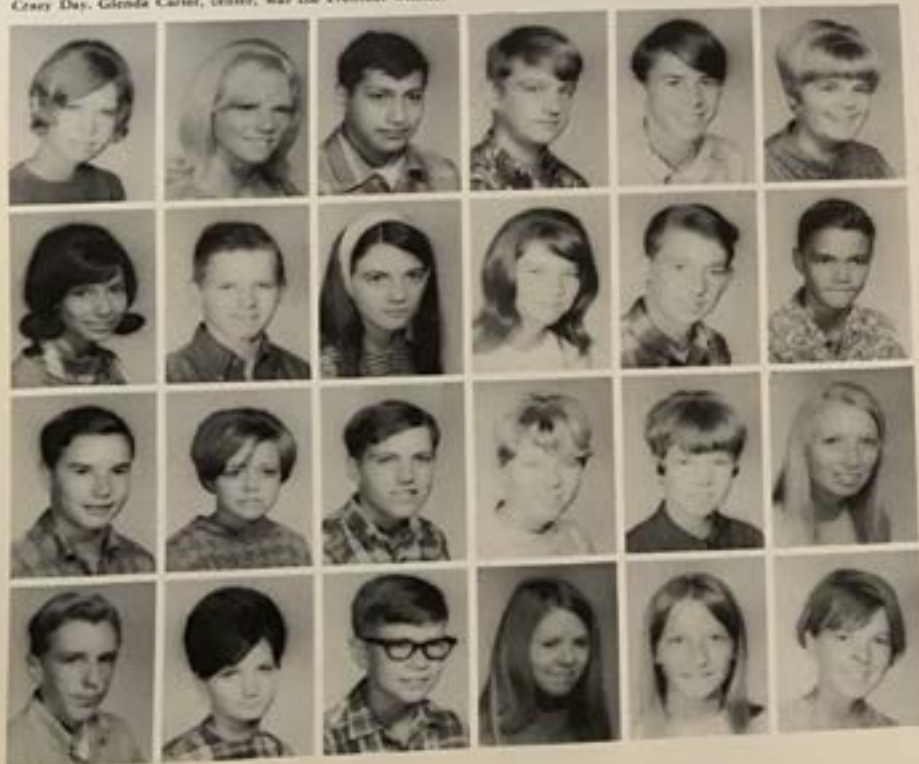

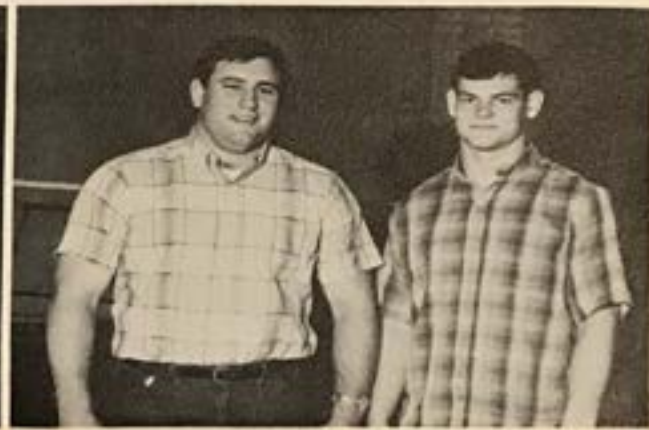

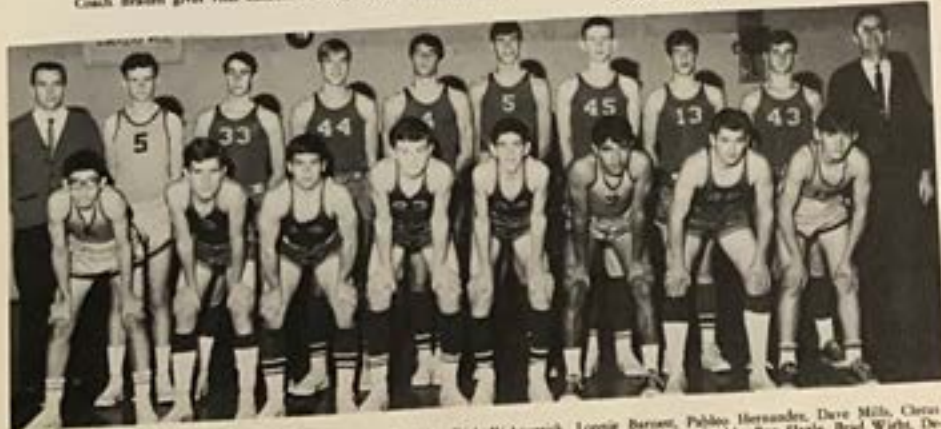

The class of 1970 made their debut as sophomores by hosting the annual fresh-soph swim party. During Homecoming festivities, the sophomore's float was rated second in class competition.

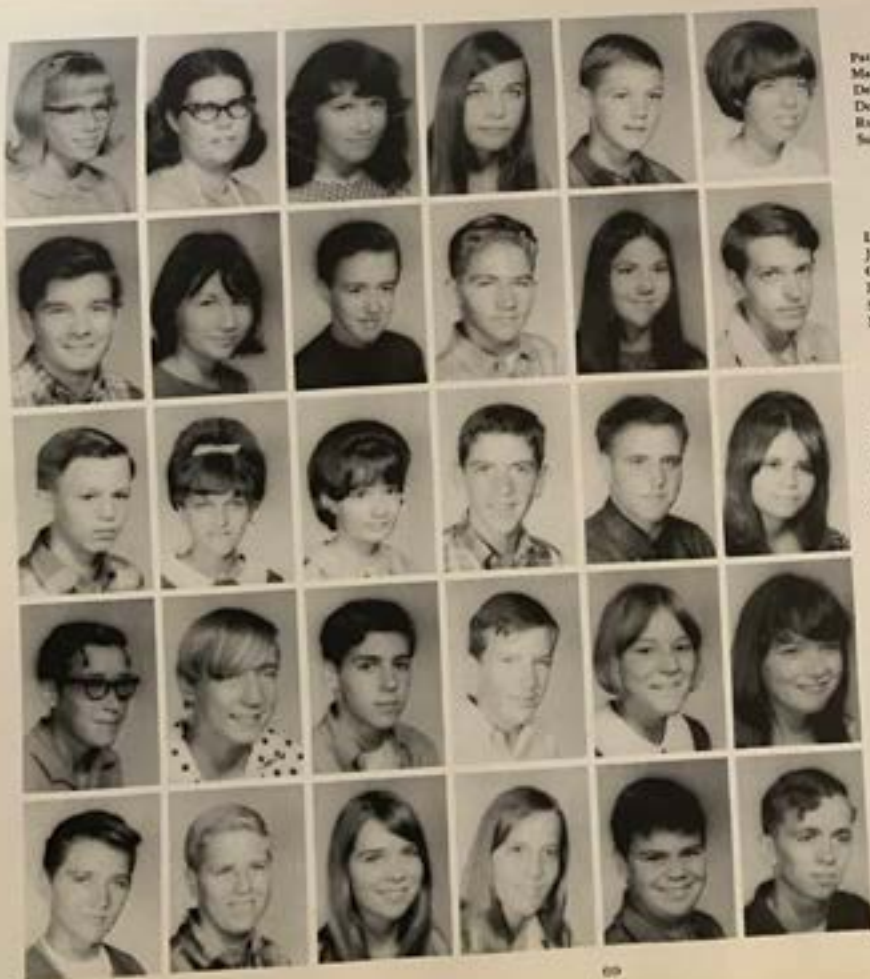

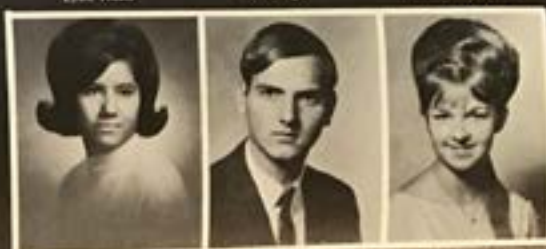

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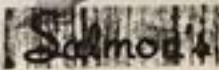
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## A Word From the Editor
