### Rain Fails To Dampen Spirit As Monarchs Go Undefeated

It must have been a long, long ride back to Riverdale for the Cowboys. The Cowboys knew that the rain would hamper the Monarch passing game. They believed that they could score if they got inside the Exeter ten yard line. They forgot one important item... the Monarch Defense. The offensive unit usually gets the glory but this time the defense won the game. Dwight Miller's field goal provided all of the points for the Sierra Division Playoff game.

Playing in a driving rain most of the night, neither team was able to move effectively. Both squads struggled all night with the wet ball and the mud. In the first half Exeter got a break when Riverdale was unable to punt on fourth down because of a bad pass from center.

It did not help much. Four plays later Exeter fumbled the ball away. Late in the second quarter, Ken Womack recovered a Cowboy fumble to set up the only scoring drive of the game.

Moving from the Riverdale 35, Stan Staley carried for seven wet yards up the center. Womack then slipped around right tackle for ten more. Staley came right back over right tackle for another ten and the wet, loyal fans were happy. Mud, rain and Riverdale held the Monarchs on the 15.

Miller got set to kick. To avoid slipping he took a short approach to the ball. Exeter fans held their breath as the ball cleared the cross bar by two feet. The Monarchs were in the lead to stay with 1:36 left in the first half.

After the break the Monarchs appeared to be on the move when Womack was dumped for a nine yard loss on the Exeter 19-yard line. On the next play Riverdale's Frank Smith recovered the slick football and the Big Blue Defense started the long second half.

## J.V.'s Capture Title With 9-0-1 Record

Plenty of thrills were provided this year by the Junior Varsity Champion, Little Monarchs. Their near perfect 9-0-1 record took the league title and their spirited play gave the early football fans something to cheer about.

Except for the frustrating tie with Kingsburg, the Blue Machine rolled over their opponents with little difficulty. The well-balanced attack offered few weak spots for their opponents.

During the season Robert Ruiz passed 102 times and completed 61 for 944 yards. He also carried the ball 36 times for 131 yards. Tim Tashjian completed eight of 16 passes.

The leading receiver was Terry Miller. He caught 26 passes for 415 yards. Don McFall was close behind him with 18 catches and 413 yards. McFall also threw

three completed passes for 144 yards and he carried once from the line of scrimmage for 61 yards.

Another versatile player is Steve Maaske. He completed two passes for 92 yards, caught ten for 259 yards and carried 80 times for 452 yards.

Larry Gayer was the leading rusher with 630 yards for 89 carries. Randy Robinson carried 94 times for 590 yards.

As a team the Little Monarchs gained a season total of 3312 yards. This was an average of 331 per game.

While the offense was grinding out an average of 34.7 points per game the super strong defense was holding the opposition to only an average of 6 points per game. The real unsung heroes were the linemen. They fought hard on defense and offense all season.

## Monarche Takes Season Opener 61-57

Varsity basketball followed the pattern set by last year's championship squad. The Monarch dropped the opening game of the season to a Porterville team. This time Monarche squeaked by 61-57. Hampered by a ridiculous rule which prohibits football players who have

not completed five days of basketball practice from competing, the Monarchs were unable to score from the outside.

In spite of the crowd under the basket most of the night, Dennis Johnson managed to drop in 23 points. Ron Graziani had

13; Jim Armstrong, nine; Dennis Aston, eight and Leonard Graziani had four. Led by Rick Reyna's 19 points, the JV's came back from an ice cold start to salvage a victory 35-29. Phil Kemp added six points; Fred Hesse, five; Graziani, three and Don McFall had two.

With first and goal on the nine things looked black for the home team. But they need not fear. . . the defense was there. Led by Gary Schrum and Dennis Andrews the Monarchs held on the one.

Four plays later Exeter had to punt and the defense was needed again.

It took eight plays but the Monarchs got the ball back. This time Schrum fell on the loose ball on the 14- yard line of Exeter to stop the threat.

The quarter ended but the plot remained about the same. Mike Botkin's punt was partially blocked and Riverdale was in great position on the Exeter 30.

Six plays later the hard charging line ripped the ball loose and Stan Wilson recovered for the blue shirts.

The longest play of the night for Exeter came on the second play of this series. Freeburn made a good fake and then slipped the ball to Womack for a try around left end. The run was good for 16 yards.

The wet, cold fans could breath easier for a few moments as the Monarchs finally moved across into Cowboy country to the 48.

Under heavy pressue, Botkin got off his best kick of the night to drive the visitors to their 7-yard line.

Alert Schrum picked off a pass to give the Monarchs their first good field position of the half on the 26 of Riverdale.

Exeter could not move and had to give the ball on downs at the 25. One good Cowboy pass moved the ball to the 43 and a short run moved it to the 48, but that was all. The defense held AGAIN, and the ball game was over in four more plays.

It is too bad that rain had to come on the night of the big game, but football was meant to be played in all kinds of weather. It would have been interesting to see what could have happened on a dry field but for the 600 or more fans who braved the elements it was a good game worth seeing.

Sometime the records are not easy to find and there is often room for argument but one thing is certain. No other football team in Exeter High history has ever won

11 games in one season. This team must be the best.

Center for the team was Mitch Rice, who suffered a torn ligament in the Strathmore game, but was outstanding all through the season.

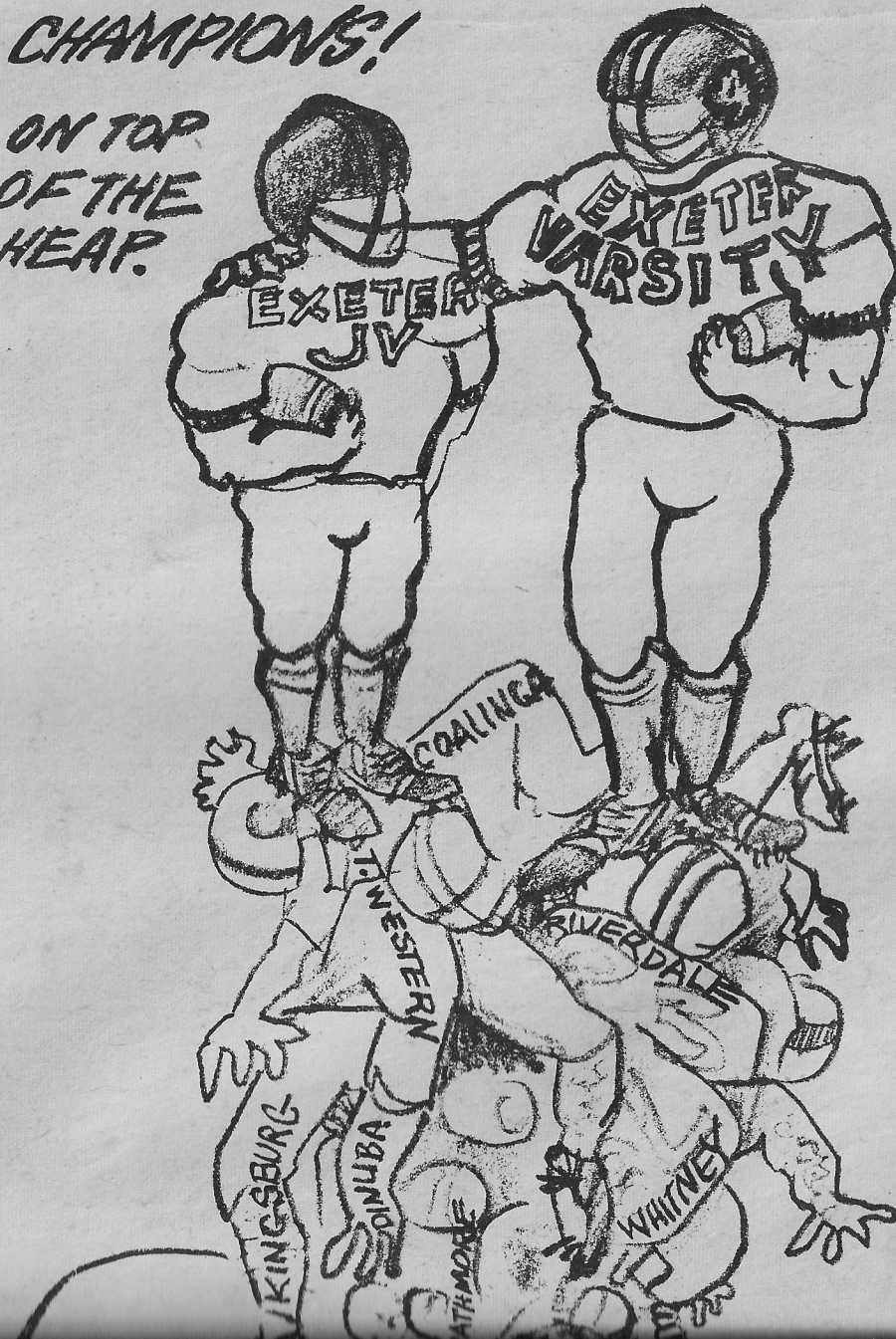
Brad Wirht was the one who caught those crazy 'tackle-eligible' passes. Everybody on the offensive line was outstanding.

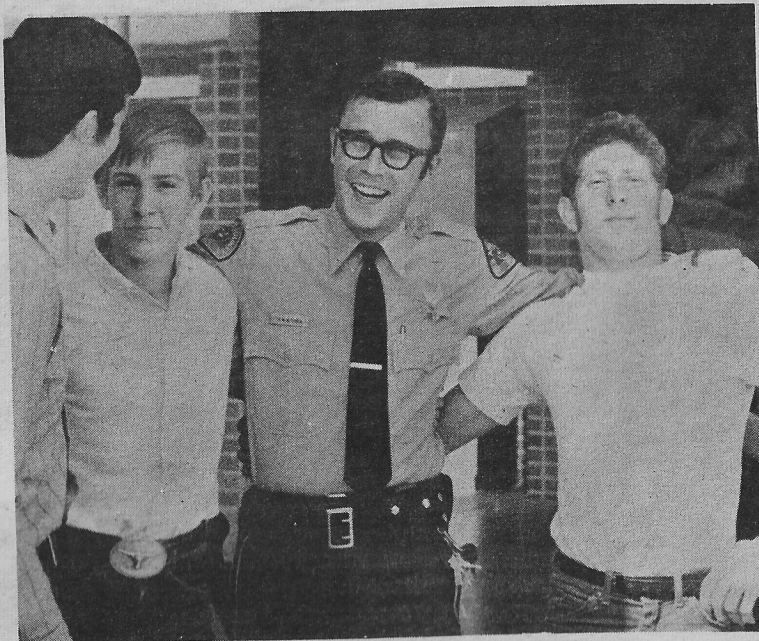
