## Johnson And Miller To State

The 35th annual California Girls State is to be held at Squaw Valley, June 17-28. This year, Debbie Johnson and her alternate, Joy Pitkin were selected to go from a group of five girls recommended by the school.

The qualifications to be chosen are very important. The candidate must be in the upper one-third of her class, scholastically and is limited to a girl who is in the 11th grade in a public school. Every girl must plan to re-enter school and complete her senior year. She must be a citizen of the United States and be physically fit enough to participate in a week of strenuous study and activity. The candidate chosen must also have potential leadership and be able to get along well with others, show interest in government and community activities and have qualities of courage and honesty.

The candidate must be able to take back to her school and community the beneficial results of her experience in sharing the civic responsibility that is emphasized at Girls State.

Four outstanding students, Gary Huffman, Randy Tharp, Gary Miller, and David Hoffman, were recommended by the school to the local chapter of the American Legion California Boy's State.

Gary Miller was chosen by a committee consisting of Mr. Bill Ellis, Mr. Roy McGuire, Mr. Francis Richards, Mr. Allen Bingham, and Mr. Bob Evans from an interview on February 29. Randy Tharp was selected as alternate.

The 35th annual Boy's State will convene on Saturday, June 17 at Sacramento State College and end the following Saturday.

Boy's State was established in 1937 to give high school aged youth a better understanding of our form of government. It is an educational program, a course in practical civics.

Each boy selected for Boy's State is assigned to a make-believe city as he registers. A group made up of several cities designates a "county" and together, they constitute a "state". The boys are divided into one of two parties, either Whig or Federalist, according to the order in which they register.

The boys will develop their own party platform and controversial issues. Their elections will be acted out according to existing California laws concerning governmental affairs. State officials are elected under the Direct Primary Law of California by the boy citizens.

The boys elect appropriate officials and make their own laws. Each city has its own Police Department to enforce the laws. Civil cases, violations of city and county ordinances, and of state laws are tried in the proper courts by the boys.

A public inaugural ceremony will be held to swear in state officials by the appropriate California state officers.

The two most outstanding citizens of the American Legion California Boy's State will represent Boy's Nation. This will convene July 14 at the American University, Washington, D.C.

Recreational activities are scheduled from 4:00 to 5:30 p.m. each day and instruction and entertainment are provided every evening. Religious services will be conducted on the school campus.

# Special Job Program Helps EUHS Students

Have you heard about some students who have jobs during school hours and wondered how they got them? EUHS has set up the Cooperative Work Experience Program for students. It is federally sponsored in cooperation with the California State Department of Vocational Education.

Mr. Dan Robbins is running the program and to qualify for a job a student must be enrolled in an agriculture class or have taken an ag class during previous years.

This program is mainly set up so that a student may have some job experience before they graduate from high school. The student spends two class periods a day at the job and all the students in the program meet weekly to have class.

Some students even work after school and weekends on their jobs.

The students get paid a minimum wage of \$1.65 an hour. This program was started in September and there were sixteen students involved at that time. ## Varsity Baseball Begins League With 2-4 Record

One of the basic rules of baseball in order to win ballgames is to not commit errors. After two quick defeats because of these costly mistakes, the Exeter Monarch baseball team has suddenly realized this vital point.

The team ended their non league schedule with a record of two wins and four losses, with the final defeat coming while playing the Woodlake Tigers by the score of 9-5.

Last Tuesday the Monarchs opened league play at Corcoran, playing in the Panthers new ballpark the "Big Blue" took just a little too long to adjust to the facility and fell by the margin of 8-5. In the first inning pitcher Robert Ruiz was unable to find home plate as he walked six and allowed three unearned runs. Reliever Randy Crist stepped in to complete the game with a very respectable performance. He allowed five runs on five hits, though one run was unearned, and struck out seven. Perhaps the determining factor of the game was the commitment of seven errors.

In the fourth inning, it seemed that Exeter was on it's way to a comeback, as they retaliated with five big runs. But in the following frame Corcoran struck back with three additional runs to end out the scoring.

Producing the hitting attack for Exeter were singles by Mike Collins, Charlie Waldrum, George Sanders, Rick Bravo, Randy Robinson and Rich Grazianl. Receiving extra base hits were Kirk Reynolds with a double, and 2 RBI's and Crist with a triple.

Today the Monarchs will play host to the Coalinga Horned-Toads at 3:45. The tentative starter for todays game is Senior Robert Ruiz.

# Gonzales Sets School Record

The Monarch track team got off to a slow start this year, taking third in a three-way meet with Tulare Western and Redwood in Visalia. But, the Monarchs came back to capture fourth place in the Sierra-Sequoia Division of the Corcoran Relays.

On their way to fourth place, Exeter grabbed first place in the mile relay with the team of Ron Smith, Tim Smith, Gary Miller and Joe Gonzales, running a 3:33.0. The same team took second in the 440 relay with a time of 45.2.

A team composed of Ron Smith, Tom Lane, Miller and Gonzales ran away with first in the sprint medley relay with a 3:42.2 clocking. Morro Bay the second place finisher, was a full two seconds behind the Monarch team.

Gonzales was the outstanding performer for Exeter in the Visalia meet. He won two events, setting a school record on the way.

He took the 880 yard run with an outstanding early-season time of 1:58.0 and set a school mark in the triple jump with a leap of 42-8.

Gonzales was Exeter's only entry in last year's state meet and owns the school mark in the 880 with a 1:57.2.

The only other Monarch to take first was Ron Smith, who sprinted the 100 yard dash in 10.3.

Exeter was strong in the pole vault where Danny Voelz and Joel Hamilton took second and third respectively, with vaults of 11-0 and 10-6.

The Monarch scoring rounded out by second place finishes in the mile and quarter-mile relays.

Exeter also finished third in "B" class competition. Tom Lane was the only winner for the Monarchs, grabbing first in the 180 low hurdles. Second place finishers for Exeter were: Keith Medico (100 and 220 yd. dashes) David Pott (high jump) and Steve Jacobs (shot put). Jacobs also took third in the discus, as did Randy Tharp in the half-mile.

In "C" class, Exeter had only four place winners, all thirds. Doug Goularte place in the 100 and 220, Richard Martinez in the mile, Rick Clark in the discus and Bob Hamnars in the high jump.

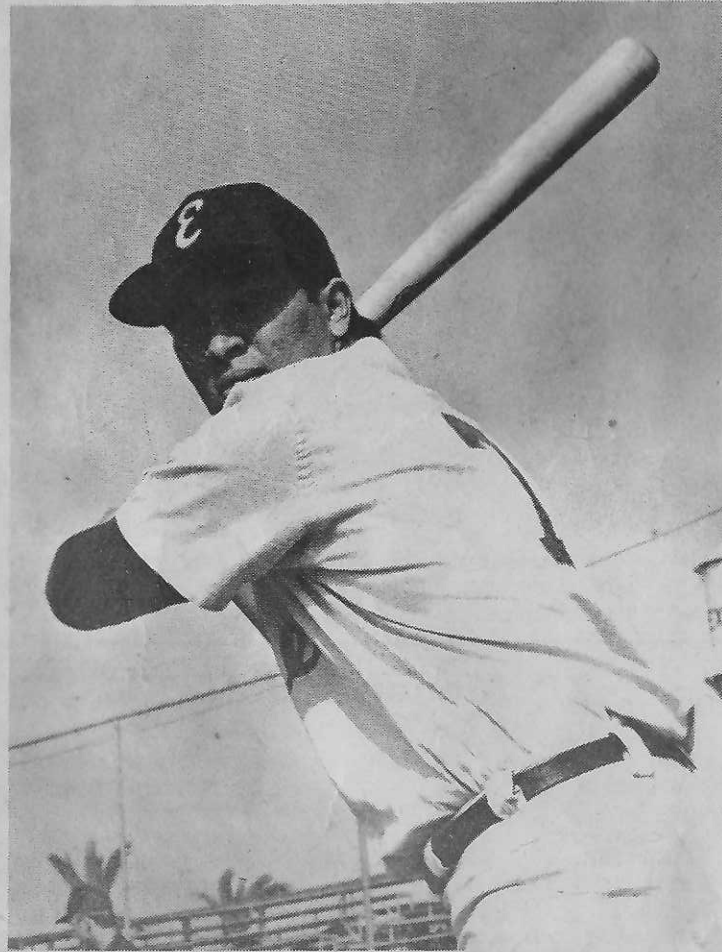
Exeter High junior varsity was triumphant over the Corcoran Panthers last Tuesday by the mark of 7-1.

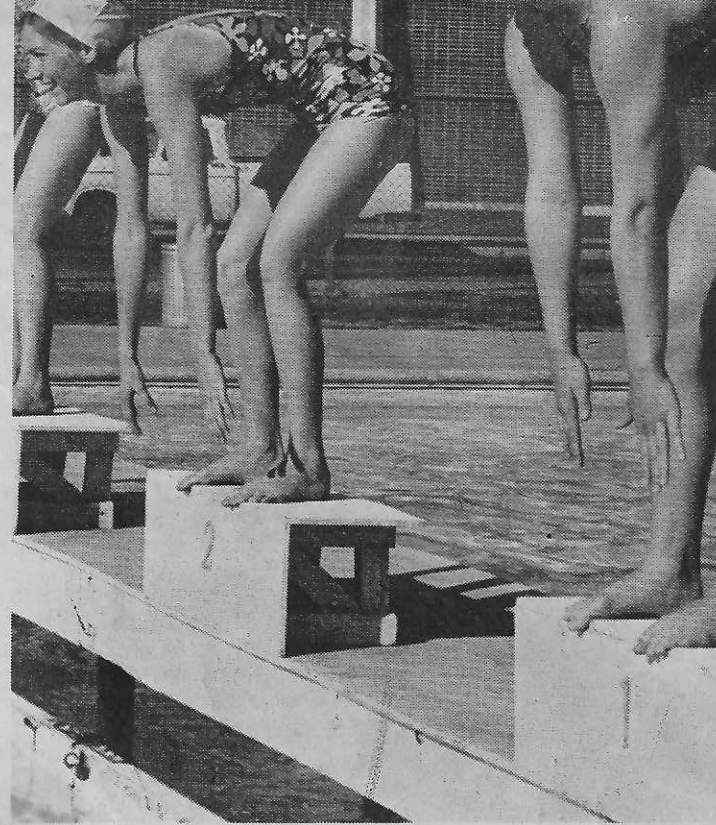

The Exeter swim team showed great promise at the Corcoran meet, even with the large number of inexperienced members.

March 10, 1972 was the first big meet of the season with Exeter taking first place in Boy's A's (61-31) Boy's B's (76-0) and girls (69-24).

School records were set by Lisa McIntash in the 100 yard individual medley (1:09.2), Debbie Coday 50 yard free style (2:28.0), Julie Griggs, Cindy Stol, Debbie Coday and Lisa McIntash in the 200 yard free relay set the new record at 1:54.9. Ron Turner set two records during the heat, which were the 200 yard free style at 1:55.5 and the 400 free style at 4:24.9. It is unusual for any school to set this many school records at their first meet of the season.
