Bond Issue Important To Future Of Exeter

What's going to happen to Exeter High? That's a good question. In case you haven's heard, there's a \$1.75 million bond election coming up next month. Elaborate plans have been made. The school architect has been around taking pictures of the students. Committees have come and gone. They all say the same thing: We need more room!

Everyone knows how cramped living is at EUHS, and this is why the board is bringing up this bond issue. We need help to improve the school (1.75 million worth of help.) As the average daily attendance of the school is getting larger, the budget, strangely enough, seems to be shrinking; shrinking by \$46,000 next year because of the Williamson Act.

The Williamson Act is great for farmers and hard on public institutions (like schools.) It allows a farmer to sign a paper promising for ten years not to subdivide his farm land which greatly reduces the taxes he has to pay. Since we are in a largly rural area, our school budget is hit hard by this act.

I realize that the taxpayers are suffering, but tomorrow's leaders need to be educated today. Exeter has long been known for its excellence in academics and sports competition, and we should strive for that goal. But without the aid of this bond issue, we'll never make it.

Have you thought about what would happen if the bond issue fails? That means no new buildings, new field houses, classrooms, improved cafteria, and no improvements to the existing structures. Sure, you say we don't really need those things anyway, but next year, we will have even more students with no where to put them.

Think about the consequences. Don't say that it's not your worry because you'll be out of here before they do anything drastic. What about your little brother or the neighbor kids who will be entering high school soon? Don't you want them to have the same high standards you've had at EUHS? Shouldn't they be allowed the chance to graduate from a high school that does everything it can



to help its students. Yes, they should, but these things take money, something that is very hard to part with these days.

The future of EUHS is in the hands of the voters, and not being of voting age hurts the students in that respect. But you can talk to your parents. Their votes count and you might be able to influence them. Help them to realize that this bond issue must pass or the standards of excellence set at EUHS will be long forgotton.

We not only need this money to improve the school. Without it, we won't be able to maintain the present standards. I hope the voters realize this when they go to the polls. The whole future of Exeter rests in the balance.

This bone issue must pass.

Without improvements to the school, the students will not have the same rights you have now. They won't be able to take the classes they want and need; there just won't be enough teachers and classrooms. We are on the way now to a double lunch schedule because our cafeteria just can't hold all the students at one time. You'll still have to go to that cruddy girls' gym (at least until 1975, and then it has to be torn down.) Even though this new school plan does have some flaws (where do you put 900 students on eight acres during brunch and lunch) it's the best that the administration and board can come up with and it's our only answer to the problem of overcrowding we are facing today at Exeter High.

Ornamental Horticulture School Is Out Decorates Lincoln School

Blisters and much satisfaction were the results of hard toil to produce fertile soil for a 20 foot garden at Lincoln School.

Procedures for planting were to disk, furrow by hand,

water the soil, and plant and water again.

Furrowing was made difficult because of the blacktop and rocks beneath the surface of the soil and uncooperative students, but the plants are now up and nearing two inches height. The produce will be given to the young gardeners.

During ornamental horticulture II, taught by Mr. Richard Clawson, who organized the gardening program, students go over to Lincoln to assist and supervise the near 50 participating students. Cynthia Leong, Emma Jo Newsome, Connie Carter, and Carl Barnett began helping the young gardeners aged seven to twelve years, about a month ago.

Giant crimson and white icicle radishes and purpletopped turnips will be planted because they are easy

and quickly grown.

There are approximately eight to ten rows of garden. Each of the participating students are responsible for 18 inches of a row and receive 18 seeds to grow.

Randy Newsome, a senior at Exeter High, has won the highest award presented to a future farmer. Last Wednesday night in Dinuba. Randy topped 138 other competitors in the FFA Farm Program Competition sponsored by Security Pacific National Bank.

The finalists represented Tulare, Kings, Fresno and Madera counties. All entrants were judged at the project sites by a team of bankers and Calif. Young Farms members.

Scores were based on the student's participation and understanding of his project, records, initiative and objectives.

There were two divisions, each based on the number of years of FFA project work. The four finalists were the top ranking student in each division in the two sections.

All competitors received certificates of merit and the top half in each division were given gold awards. Participating in the competition were Jim Wynalda, Randy Newsome, Mike Newsome, Emma Jo Newsome and Bob Van Gronigen.

Randy has received a gold award all four years of high school, which is a first in itself. Wednesday he was given the Security Pacific National Bank Award to Outstanding Future Farmer and the school was given the bank's Perpetual Trophy.

Randy's winning project includes an expanding dairy operation. He has an 18 - herd of registered Holsteins valued at \$7,000 and farms a 10-acre plot of leased walnut trees.

Randy was president of FFA this year and a recipient of a State Farmer Degree in FFA work.

He plans to study Agriculture Business Management in college and wants to be a corporation lawver.


interesting because our cast members played more

Water Polo New Sport At Exeter


A wet rugged sport will be added to the fall list of activities next year. Water Polo will be coached by Mr. Charles Hitt and Mr. Bill McGregor.




