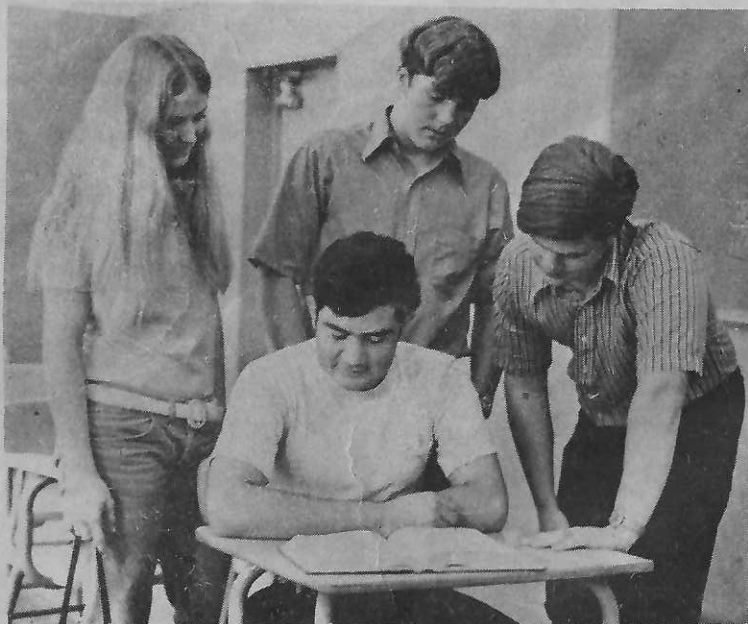

So far the police have not tracked down the culprit, but the investigation is to continue.

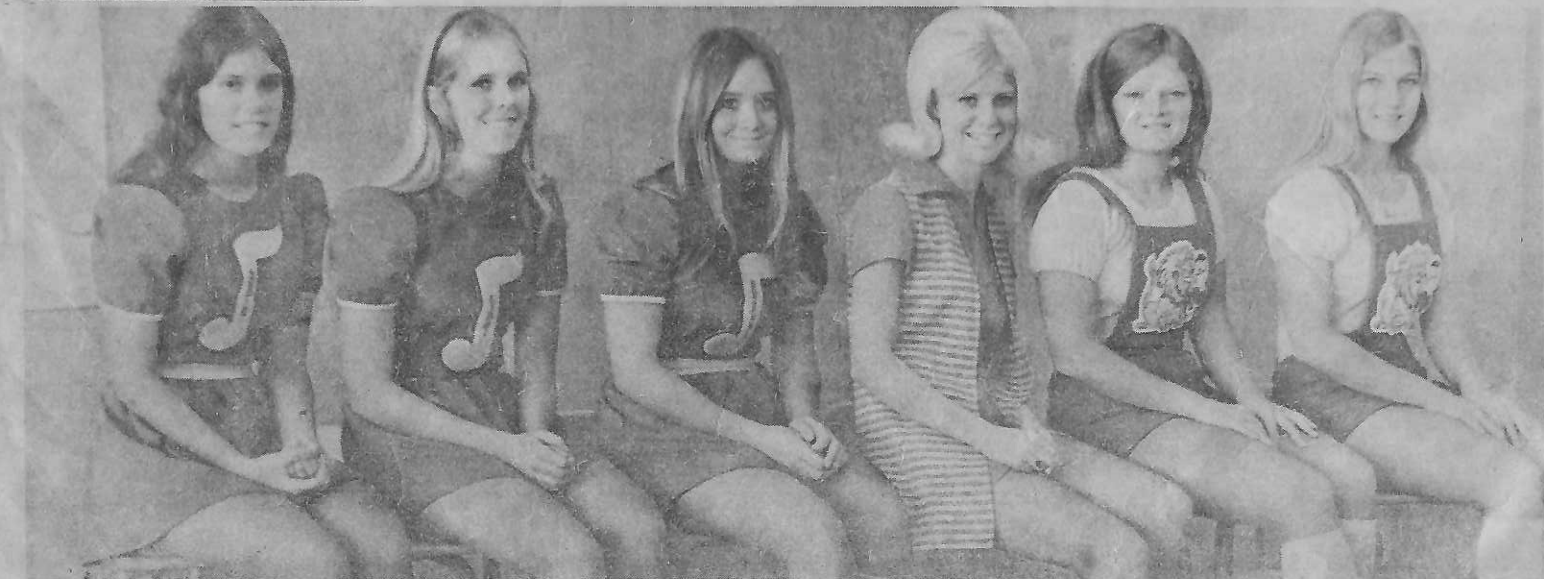

1949

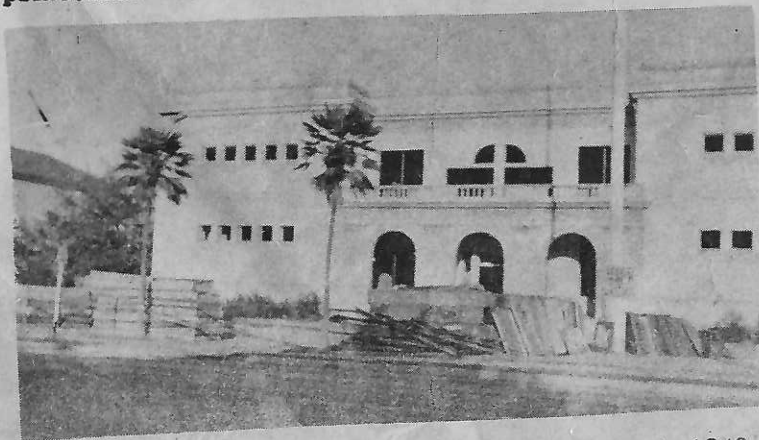

On a field trip to Mrs. Roberson's home in Porterville, the class watched the home economics teacher demonstrate with a micro wave oven. They also saw a corningware cooking counter, a built-in pantry with door shelves, and a floor-to-ceiling sewing center.

The seniors have now started sewing. A project with a lining is required to pass. There are many things that can be lined. They include vests, coats, and jumpers.

Hobby crafts of embroidery, macreme, weaving, and astheometry (string drawings) were taught to the junior classes. Many belts and a few purses were made by macreme.

Some belts were produced by weaving, several other articles of decor and wearing apparel were also made from different processes.

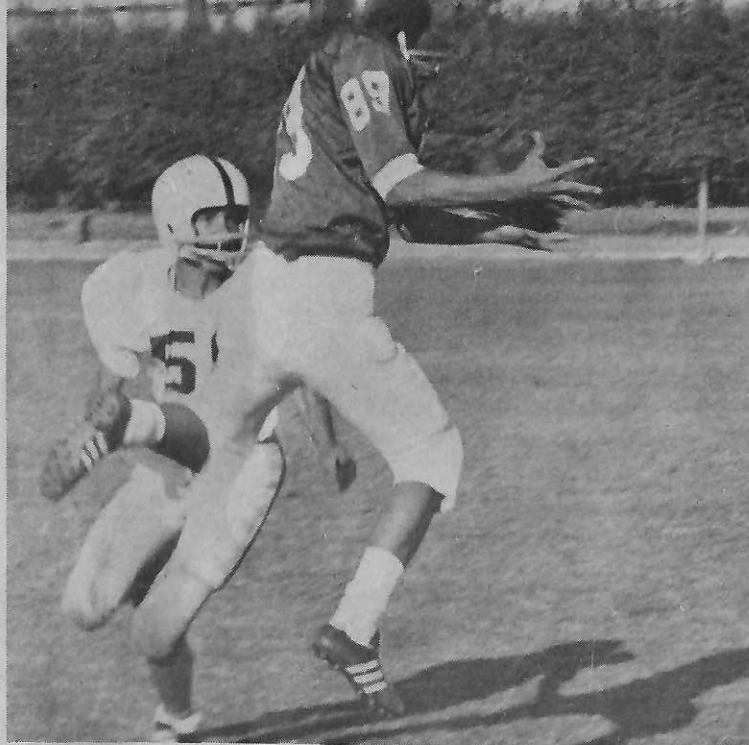
