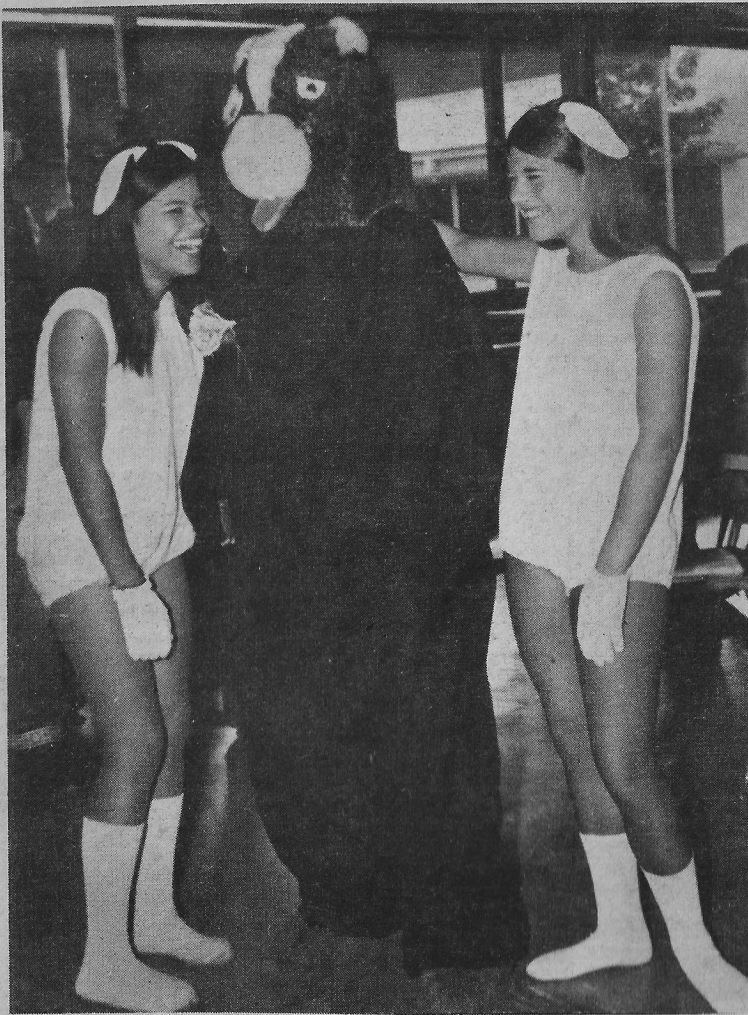

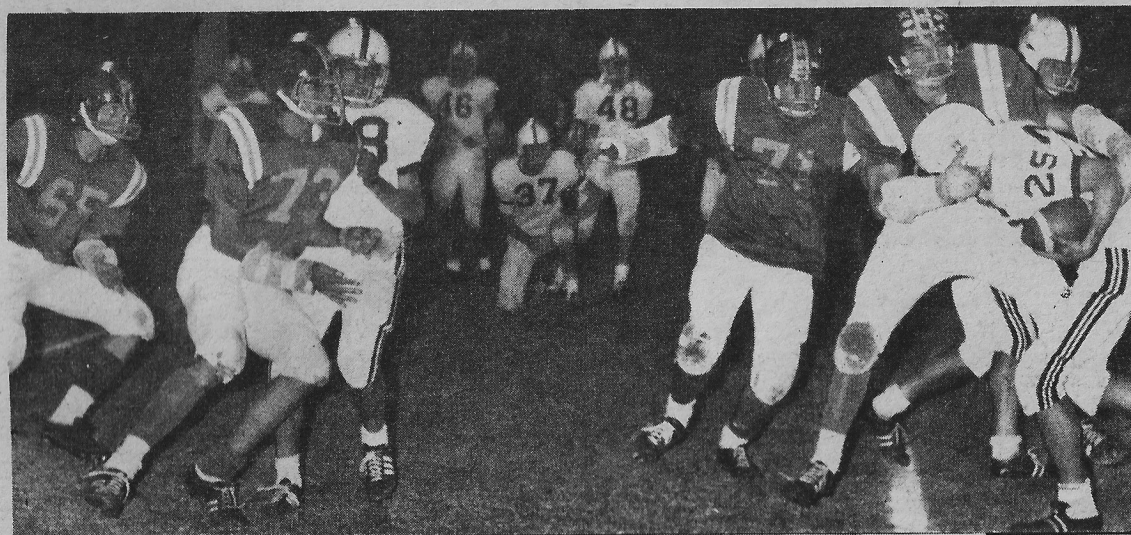

SCE Sponsors Nuclear Exhibit

A mobile nuclear exhibit trailer which tells the story of how electricity is generated -- from falling water to splitting atoms -- was on display at the west end of the boys gym on November 3 and 4.

Presented as a public service by Southern California Edison Company, the mobile exhibit is devoted mainly to nuclear energy.

The exhibit utilizes animated simulations of nuclear processes, along with drawings, models and tape recordings to dramatize the past, present, and probable future of atomic

salting seawaters, killing cancer cells, preserving food, developing new kinds of plants, and making stronger plastics.

Specialized displays explain how nuclear power plants work, and describe the principal types of reactors--including the "fast breeder" that is now under development which actually creates more fuel than it consumes!

One exhibit is devoted to Edison's San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station, and there is a cut-away model of the plant designed to illustrate the function of

Freeburn, who was 9 for 19 and gained 120 yards passing, also found Miller in the end zone. Agile Miller was hit as he caught the pass. He juggled the ball but kept control for the touchdown.

Staley plunged in from the one for the final score. Exeter's lineman, the Pigs, did a fantastic job all night.

Phil Kemp grabbed a short punt and ran all the way for Exeter's second score.

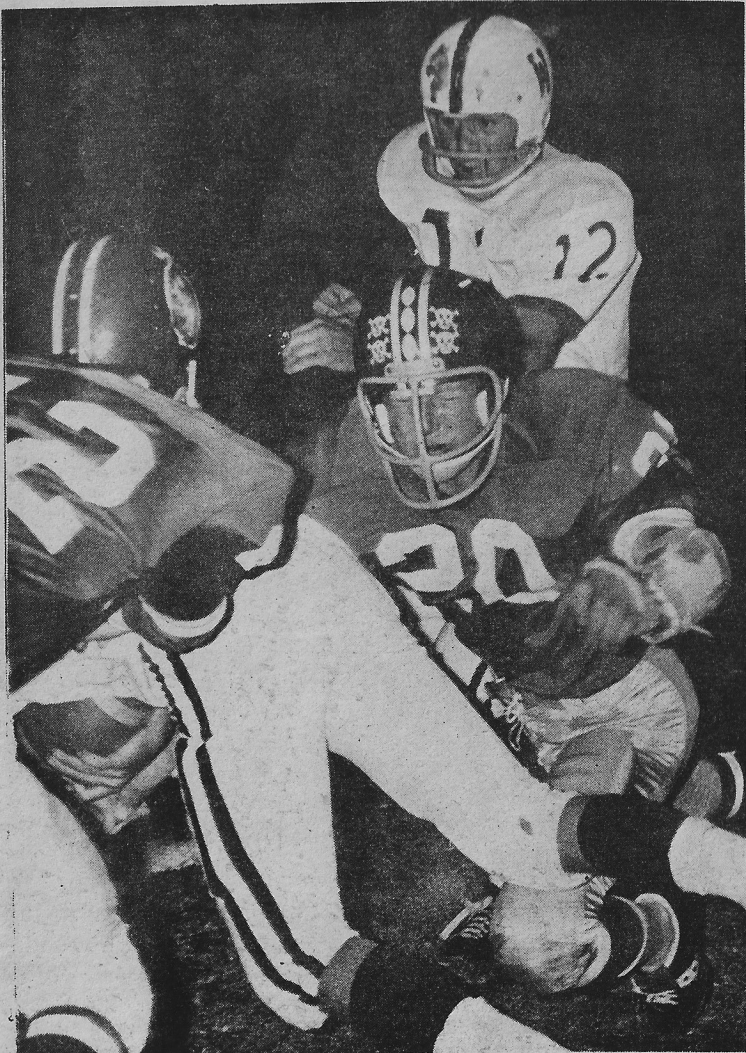

Exeter J. V's explosive offense after averaging 50 points a game was almost brought to a complete stop as Kingsburg and Exeter tied 6-6.

The game was a fight to the finish as Exeter dominated the total offense 279 to Kingsburg's mere net of 39 yards. The Little Monarchs drove inside the twenty yard line four times but Kingsburg's stingy defense halted two of the drives and on the other two they caused Exeter to fumble.

With 1:36 left in the ball game Exeter had the ball on the Norsemen 20 yard line. They bucked the line until they were at the two yard line with 10 seconds left. Ruiz quickly called the team set because Exeter had no time-outs left. Again they tried the line, but they ended up eight inches short of the goal line when the final gun went off.
