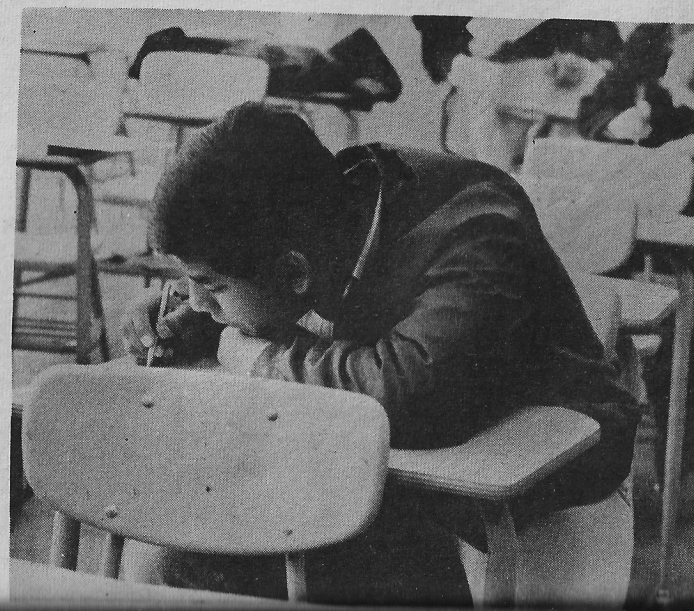

given numbers in the order that their birthdates were chosen by the people in Washington. Those who's birthdates were drawn first were assigned the number 1 and so on through the 366 dates.

Beginning in January, potential draftees will be called in the order in which their birthdates were drawn. Men that are not called by the end of the year will be free from the draft liability entirely unless there is a national emergency. After the drawing of dates, the letters of the alphabet were picked to determine the order of selection within a given birthdates.

It has been estimated that men whose birthday numbers are one to 122 will probably be drafted. Those from 123 to 244 are lower on this list and have a 50% chance of being called. Those from 245 to 366 may never be drafted. The lottery does not affect deferments or exemptions. A man who now has a deferment may retain it.

The number assigned to a man will stick with him. Future lotteries there will be one each fall will determine the order of selection only for men who are 19 years of age that year.

New Uniforms Being Reordered

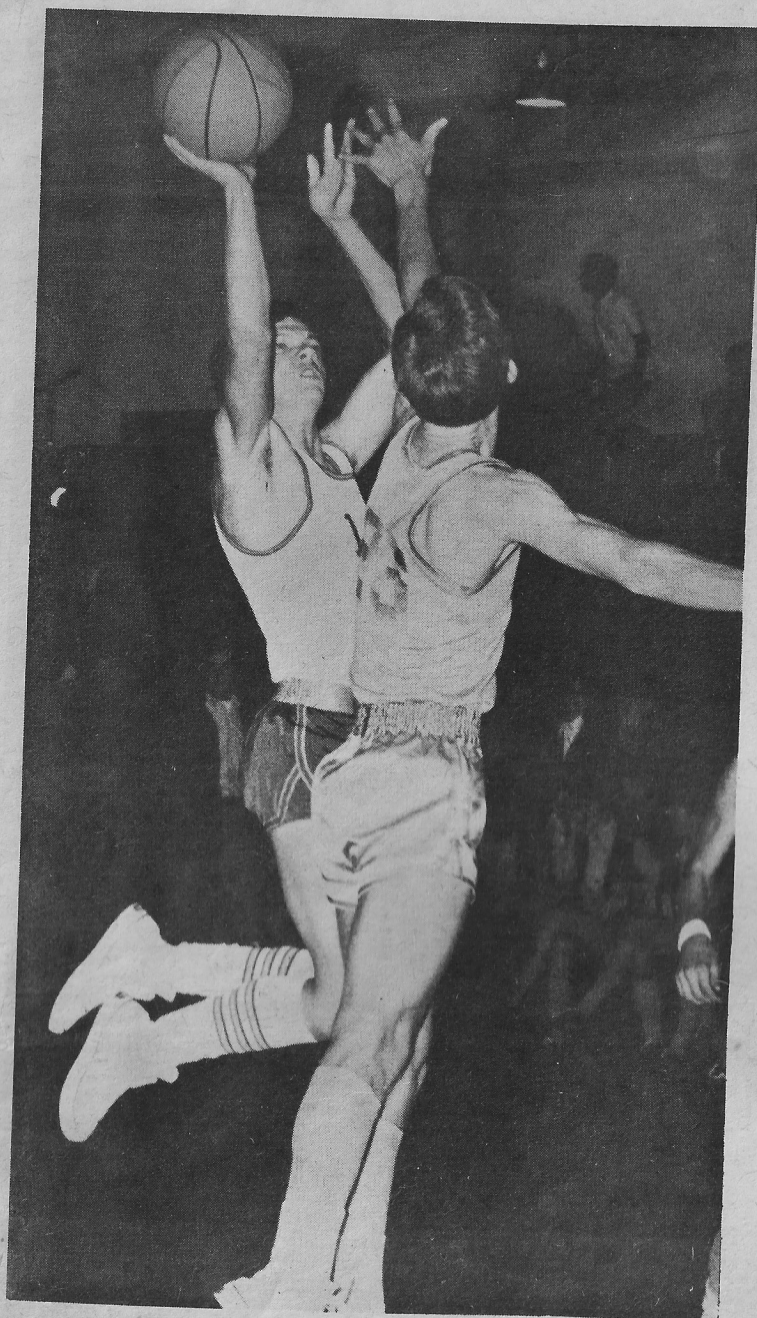

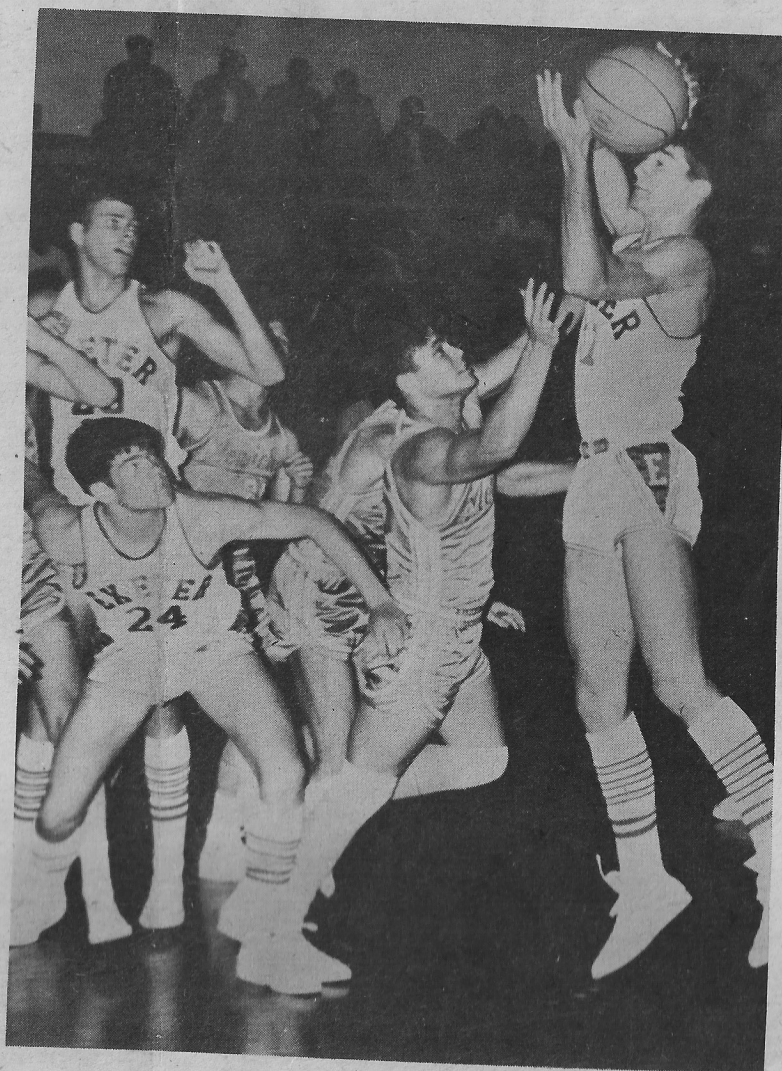

The JV wrestlers had a tougher time than the Varsity as they lost to Mt. Whitney 24-30.

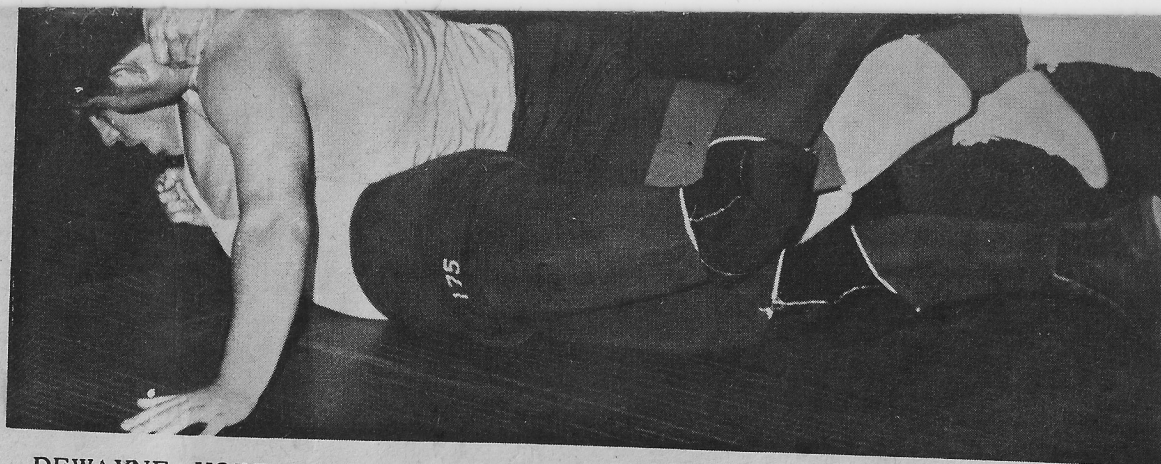
It was a close match all the way and it looked as if Exeter might pull it out with only two matches left when Dwayne Hopper pinned him man to give Exeter a 24-22 lead.

J.V.'s Defeat Monache 28-27

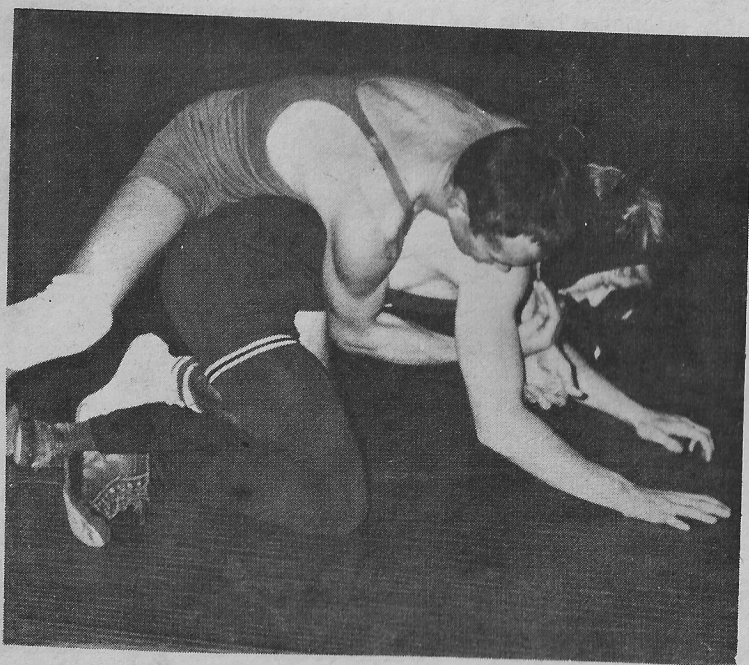
The Exeter J.V. basketball team used a strong third quarter to gain 28-27 over Monache in the home opener for the little Monarchs.
