In competition with schools our own size we are doing much better with a league record of two wins and no losses. So far, the team has an overall record, including larger schools, of four wins, three losses. At the Invitational track meet on Saturday the B class did very well against Lemoore at Corcoran; our team ended with a second,

competing with twenty four other schools.

One of the outstanding members of the team is Eric Rawls, who has run the quarter mile in 50.3 and is number five in the valley. 
