Monarch standouts Eric Rawls and David Mills were named to the first string offensive and defensive teams in the West Sequoia League all-star selections.

Rawls, a hard running 175 pound senior, was selected to the first string offensive team. Rawls was

#### **EUHS Hall Of Fame**

Soon we at Exeter High will be proud to see two more pictures of outstanding Monarch athletes in the Hall of Fame.

Joining the nine other pictures on the cafeteria wall will be the pictures of Dale Wurtsmith and Jeff Wirht.

Dale is the first athlete in Exeter High history to be in the Hall of Fame for more than one sport. His sports are wrestling and football. Dale will be joining two other wrestlers in the Hall of Fame. They are Dwight Herron, 1961, and Nick Nino, 1963. Dwight had never been pinned, and Nick was the league and divisional champion in the 120 lb. weight group.

Dale will also be joining Steve Stanley, Vernon Reams and Tom Phillips in the football section.

Steve Stanley was a starter in the North-South Shrine game along with Vernon Reams who was voted most valuable lineman in 1964.

Tom Phillips was on the Monarch Varsity for four years and gained 1207 yards as a senior in 1962.


REX CAUDLE is on top to stay in his Varsity match against Tulare. This match was a warm-up for the big one tonight against Tulare Western.

The Exeter Monarch Varsity wrestling team defeated Bullard by a score of 26-24 for their first wrestling match of the year on December 3. The Junior Varsity scoring was again dominated by Exeter 36-21.

On December 6, our Monarch Varsity wrestling team made a 38 to 9 win against the Hanford Bull Dogs. The Hanford Junior Varsity, however, proved to be a little too strong for the Exeter J.V. squad, and Exeter lost 23-36.

On Tuesday, December 10, the Exeter Varsity wrestling squad gained their third straight win by dumping the Tulare Union Redskins in the Varsity match. Physiology is one of the many interesting classes available on the EUHS campus. Those who take physiology usually have some interest in this field or something similar to it.



Mr. Gene Shields, the instructor, helps the students with their projects from their textbooks. He also teaches Sophomore biology.

They are now dissecting cats and comparing the position of the cats' organs and muscles to those of human beings. A lot of studying has been done before they could start this project.

They also have doctors and other professional people in the field of physiology come to lecture about their particular field.

Later on in the year they will take a field trip to Porterville State Hospital and perhaps other field trips, if possible.
