By this time many of you have already met our AFS foreign exchange student. Her name is Chela Andrade and she is from Ambato, Ecuador. Ambato has a populatio of about 50,000 and is situated in the mountians at about the 4,000 foot level. Chela's family includes her mother and father, five brothers, and two sisters besides herself. She arrived here August 7 and is now residing with Rhonna Schelling and her family.

In asking Chela how she likes Exeter, she replied "I like itl' She said, however, that in New York she had her first encounter with the American monetary system and didn't know how to pay for souvenirs she wanted.

In comparing Exeter's school system with Ambato's, she states that Exeter's schedule is not nearly as long. She took fifteen different classes her senior year and attended school from 7:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on weekdays. On Saturdays she attended classes from 7:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon. She has already graduated from high school in Ambato. The school season is from October to July in Ecuador and is divided into three grading periods.

Chela says that the seasons in Ecuador are not like those in the United States. Since she lives near the equator, the climate is very mild and rainy. She says it doesn't get nearly as hot as it does here and it gets colder only in July. It doesn't get cold enough to snow and where

she lives, but in the higher mountains it does.

One of the first hings Chela mentioned in the interview was that her senior class trip lasted for five school days when they all went to the coast. She attended a private school, however, and said most public schools only have a three day senior trip.



Walter M. Smith CHEERS... Remembers EUHS He Helped Mold

BY JULIE DOCTOR Many of the students at Exeter Union High School have parents who remember Walter M. Smith. Still residing in Exeter, he was the principal at EUHS from 1919 to 1947. In addition, he had been a history teacher and athletics director from 1912 to 1919.

Mr. Smith's main recollection of Exeter High's early days was that the school rarely paid for any of the school functions. He said that during the first years, the school didn't furnish transportation for any of the students living out of town. There were no free textbooks

Students had to buy their own paper and pencils, and the school never financially supported the athletic teams or furnish transportation for the out of town games.

An avid sports fan for many years. Mr. Smith still follows Exeter's athletic teams. He has many vivid memories of Exeter's past in sports. During his first seven years as the athletics director, he alone coached all of the sports. During

this time there was only one football team and and they averaged about four games a season. The players all made their own uniforms as none were furnished. If they decided that they wanted to have a game with another school. they would write a letter to the school and:ask them to pay for the railroad fare for the whole team and to give them lunch and dinner, also. The games were played on Saturday afternoons because there weren't any lights on the fields.

Mr. Smith recalls coaching the tennis team and, at his instigation, Exeter's first tennis courts were built. In 1915, he took a team of two boys and two girls to the Valley meet and came home with first place. He remembers taking the team and another teacher who had accompanied them out to a victory dinner afterwards, and the dinner cost only \$1.80 for all six of them.

Since retiring from the school system, Mr. Smith has been involved in many community services, and in 1958 he won Exeter's Man of the Year award for his outstanding work in the community. He is still an active member of the Kiwanis club, and was for many years the chairman of the Community Chest drive in Exeter!

EUHS: Getting Too Big For Our Britches

Have you noticed how the school has seemed to shrink during the past few years? It's not the school; it's just that the population of the school is growing. There was a time when you could have any class you wanted, but no more, with a growth rate of 15% in the last five years, you're lucky if you even get the required classes, and getting the elective classes you want is almost an impossibility. Afer all, where do you put 870 students in a school built for only 500

We are now going through an accreditatin program. the last one we received the maximum of five years accreditation and the only problems were the over- crowded classrooms and lack of airconditioning. On the whole, the quality of EUHS is very good but is slowly declining because of over-crowding.

What about our buildings? Except for the two relocatable building all of the permanent structures on our campus are over 25 years old. The boys' gym is inadequate there just isn't enough room for everyone. The girls' gym is a terror -- part of it is already condemned. Heat in the classrooms during the winter is either so high that you sweat to death or nonexistent, and air-conditioning the school is a dream long lost in time and expense.

But there is a light shining in the distance. A new taxes to pay for newly rebuilt Lincoln School.

Have you ever made a request to see your counselor and had to wait a month before you were even able to be called in. With only three counselors for 900 students, it's a little hard to get to everyone. Seeing our principal, Mr. Robert Heath, is almost impossible unless you're in for discipline. most of which is handled by vice-principal Charles Hitt, anyway.

There has been talk for the past few years to annex the block east of the campus for new buildings. Ifwe want any satisfaction with our high school the only answer is a new school. The buildings are old and out - dated. The auditorium, though one of the most structurally sound buildings on campus, is a horror for any kind of stage

production. The lighting is bad and the curtains are about to rot away. Besides these complaints, it is too small for all of the students to fit in at one time, and many people aren't happy with the double assembly schedule that was begun this year.

We have many problems. with no way of solving them. But our school does need help. Next time your parents say that they aren't voting for a school bond because it only goes for the teachers' salaries. reminded them of the crowded gym classes, and the full cafeteria, and the class that you wanted to take but couldn't get in because there wasn't any room. Let them know that we need their help to make our school better. And if we better our school, we will have the chance to better ourselves.








