Detention Rules

1. Detention is each school day from 3:00 until 3:55 in Room 15.

6. If a student cuts detention twice, he will be suspended for a period of three days.

7. If a student cuts detention the third time he will be suspended for a period of five days.

8. Upon the fourth offense, the student may be dropped from Exeter Union High School.

Dress And Grooming Code

The following code is in a form approved by the courts:

The guiding principle: has been "moderation in all things." Of paramount importance in the design of the code was concern for the health and safety of the students and the avoidance of distractions to the educative process.

"The purpose of this set of rules is threefold:

1. To set the limits of what are acceptable dress and grooming in school;

2. In recognition of the identity of the school as a place for teaching and learning, to encourage that mode of dress and grooming which is conducive to establishing a climate for such teaching and learning;

3. To reflect the concern of students, parents, teachers, and administrators with those factors of dress and grooming which may affect the education of young people in a democracy."

"Nothing which appears in this code is to be interpreted to limit the responsibility and obligation of teachers to make and enforce regulations concerning control of hair or clothing in the interests of safety demonstrably involved, in any specific teaching situation.

Pertains to both Boys and Girls:

1. The wearing of head coverings or of hair curlers or the use of toilet articles is prohibited in

4. Clothes are to be in good taste.

Pertains to Girls:

1. Slacks may be worn so long as they conform to other provisions herein pertaining to safety, provocative effects, distractive influence and disciplinary violations. No type of blue jeans are to be worn.

If the dean feels that a student's grooming is not satisfactory the student and parent shall be asked to correct the situation.

General Information

ACADEMIC PROBATION

A student failing in three or more subjects at the end of a nine (9) week period shall have the succeeding nine weeks to raise his grade level. If at the end of this period the grades are not sufficiently improved, the student may be withdrawn from regular school.

ATTENDANCE

The only excused absences from school are given for personal illness and professional medical visits. All other absences are recorded as unexcused. Voluntary Make-up may be given in some cases of unexcused absences when arrangements have been made with the Dean prior to the absence.

4. The Spring Academic Awards Program (for all academic achievements during the year).

The Academic Awards is handled by the CSF with cooperation of the administration.

CHECKING OUT OF SCHOOL IF YOU MOVE OR DROP

If you have to leave school because you are moving or dropping out, you must bring a written note to either the Dean of Girls or the Vice-Principal signed by your parents or guardian stating why you are checking out. If you neglect this you will not be cleared with us and you will have difficulty later in obtaining grades or recommendations from this school.

CIVIL DEFENSE

The signal for a civil defense drill will be announced over the public address system presently installed in the school. Instructions will be given as to the method of carrying out the drill. In case of extreme emergency, such as a bomb blast, lay down against a wall or under your desk with your face down.

CLEAN-UP AND PASSING

Students must remain in all buildings (except the boys and girls gym) until the passing bell rings ending the period. Honor card holders may be excused with permission of the

4. The two quarter grades are averaged up and the semester citizenship grades become a part of the permanent record.

SOCIAL PROBATION

1. If a student receives three or more unsatisfactory citizenship grades, he/she is placed on social probation. The parents are to be notified and invited in for a conference with the deans. Special help will be given to the student.

2. The student is given one quarter to improve citizenship grades or he may be withdrawn from Exeter High School.

3. Possible loss of extra-curricular privileges.

DANCES

To be eligible to attend a dance a student must be a regularly enrolled student at Exeter High School at the time of the dance. Guests will be permitted to attend only if their names appear on the guest list.

You may bring a guest to the dance, however they must be registered in advance on the dance list. A student bringing a guest is responsible for that guest's behavior.

Students must remain in the dance until they are ready to leave for the evening. No one will be readmitted after he has left the building. The dances start shortly after the athletic event and will last two hours. Under no circumstances will a dance last past 12:00 p.m.. All dances are two hours in length except for the prom which is three hours.

tending school may be revoked. The failure of a student to comply with the duties he is bound to perform constitutes misconduct, and such a student is liable to probation, suspension or expulsion. The pupils' duties are as follows:

1. Comply with the rules and regulations of Exeter Union High School.

2. Pursue the required course of study.

3. Submit to the authority of the Principal and the teachers of the school.

4. Display proper conduct to and from school, on school grounds, school buses, and at all school activities.

5. Abstain from gambling, immorality, profanity, using tobacco, narcotics, or intoxicating liquors on or about school property.

7. Be diligent in study. To be diligent in study a student shall:

- a. Complete assigned work on time.

- b. Pay attention to the teacher.

- c. Exhibit good citizenship.

- d. Do that caliber of work consistent with the student's individual ability and grade level.

- e. Co-operate with teachers and other students.

- f. Be regular and punctual in attendance.

ELIGIBILITY RULES

Students must have a satisfactory rating in both scholarship and citizenship before he can represent Exeter High School in any extra-curricular activity. Extra-curricular is defined as any activity which

the classroom.

2. Prohibited for wear in school is foot gear not intended for out-of-home wear. A student may not go barefooted.

3. Jewelry, buttons, and other forms of ornamentation (including those containing slogans, endorsement, or commentary) are permissible except that they shall not make distracting noises, espouse violence, be obscene, suggest obscenity, or call for an illegal act.

4. Dark glasses shall not be worn inside school buildings except for medical reasons attested to by permission slip issued by school nurse in response to doctor's note with time interval indicated.

5. Modesty and the avoidance of distracting influences are to be the key to dress. Prohibited are the nude look, see-through or peek-a-boo modes (not including sheer garments with appropriately concealing undergarments, i. e., slips camisoles, etc.) revealing fashions (i. e., slit skirts, bare midriffs, cut-outs), cut or torn articles of clothing, undergarments worn as outer wear, tank tops, and styles which exaggerate, emphasize, or call attention to anatomical details.

Pertains to Boys:

1. Must be clean shaven.
2. Hair not over or below eyebrows, ears entirely visible and not on or below a chain worn around the neck.

3. Sideburns are permitted. Down to but not

misses 3.2 days of school each year. Those students who have an attendance problem will be required to verify their absences with a doctor's statement upon notification.

The law states that any student is to be reported as truant who has been absent from school without valid excuse more than three days in one school year (Education Code 12401).

Clearing Absences

Students who forget to bring their notes from home will be given an unexcused on their readmits. They will have three school days to clear the absence, if it is not cleared it becomes a truancy. Those students who need to clear a readmit will have their names read over the bulletin to remind them.

AWARDS PROGRAMS

One of the ways in which student achievement is honored is by the presentation of various awards by the school and the community. These consist of trophies, medals, certificates, emblems, and letters.

We have four Awards Programs during the year:

1. The Fall Sports Program (for football, cross country and water polo).

2. The Winter Sports Program (for wrestling and basketball).

3. The Spring Sports Program (for baseball, tennis, swimming, golf and track).

CITIZENSHIP POLICY OF EXETER UNION HIGH SCHOOL

Reasons for a Citizenship Policy:

1. Education is a privilege . . . It is a privilege that carries with it responsibilities. Those responsibilities are to live up to one's obligations and duties. No student has the right to create a situation in school or in a class that disrupts, annoys or in any way does harm to the program.

2. One of the primary aims of the school is directed toward helping students to become good citizens as adults. It follows then, that a citizenship policy would help toward this end.

3. Parents, potential employers, law enforcement agencies and others quite often want to know what kind of citizen the student is.

THE GRADE

8 - Unsatisfactory

PROVISIONS

1. Everyone starts each quarter with a "1" in every class.

2. A "1" citizen makes a positive effort in class.

3. Citizenship grades are lowered by:

- A. Being tardy;

- B. Coming to class unprepared;

- C. Being a discipline problem;

- D. Lack of effort;

DANCE RULES

1. The following are prohibited:

- a. Returning to dance after leaving

- b. Smoking or drinking

- c. Elementary school students

- d. Attendance at dance if absent more than two periods that day.

2. School dress is acceptable wear, unless otherwise stated.

3. Students are expected to conduct themselves in a mature manner.

DRIVER TRAINING

A student must be fifteen and one-half and not over eighteen years of age to take driver training. Driver Education must be completed satisfactorily before being eligible for in the car training. Sign up is made directly with the driving teachers.

DUTIES OF PUPILS

The Education Code and the California Administrative Code set forth the duties of pupils concerning their attendance in the public schools. As a matter of law, the admittance to, and the continued attendance in, a public school is a privilege dependent upon compliance with the laws of the State of California. The Rules and Regulations of the State Board of Education, and the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Trustees. It follows that when a pupil does not comply with the law and the rules, the privilege of at-

is not curricular (not in classroom) such as athletics, band trips, club activities, etc. .

Satisfactory scholarship means that a student is passing in at least four subjects, one of which maybe Physical Education.

EXCERPTS FROM CALIFORNIA EDUCATION CODE

COMPULSORY FULL-TIME ATTENDANCE. All children between the ages of eight and eighteen years not exempted by law, are required to attend public full-time day school for the full time for which the public schools of the district are in attendance.

EXCLUSION OF PUPILS. School Board may exclude children with filthy or vicious habits, or children suffering from contagious or infectious diseases.

Pupils may be suspended or expelled for misconduct. Causes for suspension include continued willful disobedience, open and persistent defiance of the authority of the teacher, habitual profanity or vulgarity, smoking cigarettes or having cigarettes upon the school premises, defacing or otherwise injuring school property, or membership in any secret fraternity, sorority or club. Parents or guardians are liable for willful damage by pupils to school property.

EXTRA CURRICULAR

Anything that is not actual classroom instruction during regular school day

is extracurricular.

1. All athletics other than P.E., classes.

2. All musical productions:

- a. Parades
- b. Pep Bands
- c. Concerts
- d. Trips

3. All speech and drama productions.

4. All F.F.A. Contests.

5. Any other group representing EUHS including rooters buses and spectators groups.

STUDENTS ARE NOT TO ACTIVELY PARTICIPATE IN ANY SCHOOL SPONSORED ACTIVITY IF THEY HAVE NOT ATTENDED AT LEAST FOUR PERIODS THAT DAY. THIS INCLUDES DANCES, BALLGAMES, PRACTICE, TOURNAMENTS, FIELD DAYS, ETC. IN ORDER TO BE A SPECTATOR, YOU MUST BE IN SCHOOL PART OF THE DAY.

The penalty for breaking this rule is FIVE school days ineligibility to participate in any school activity.

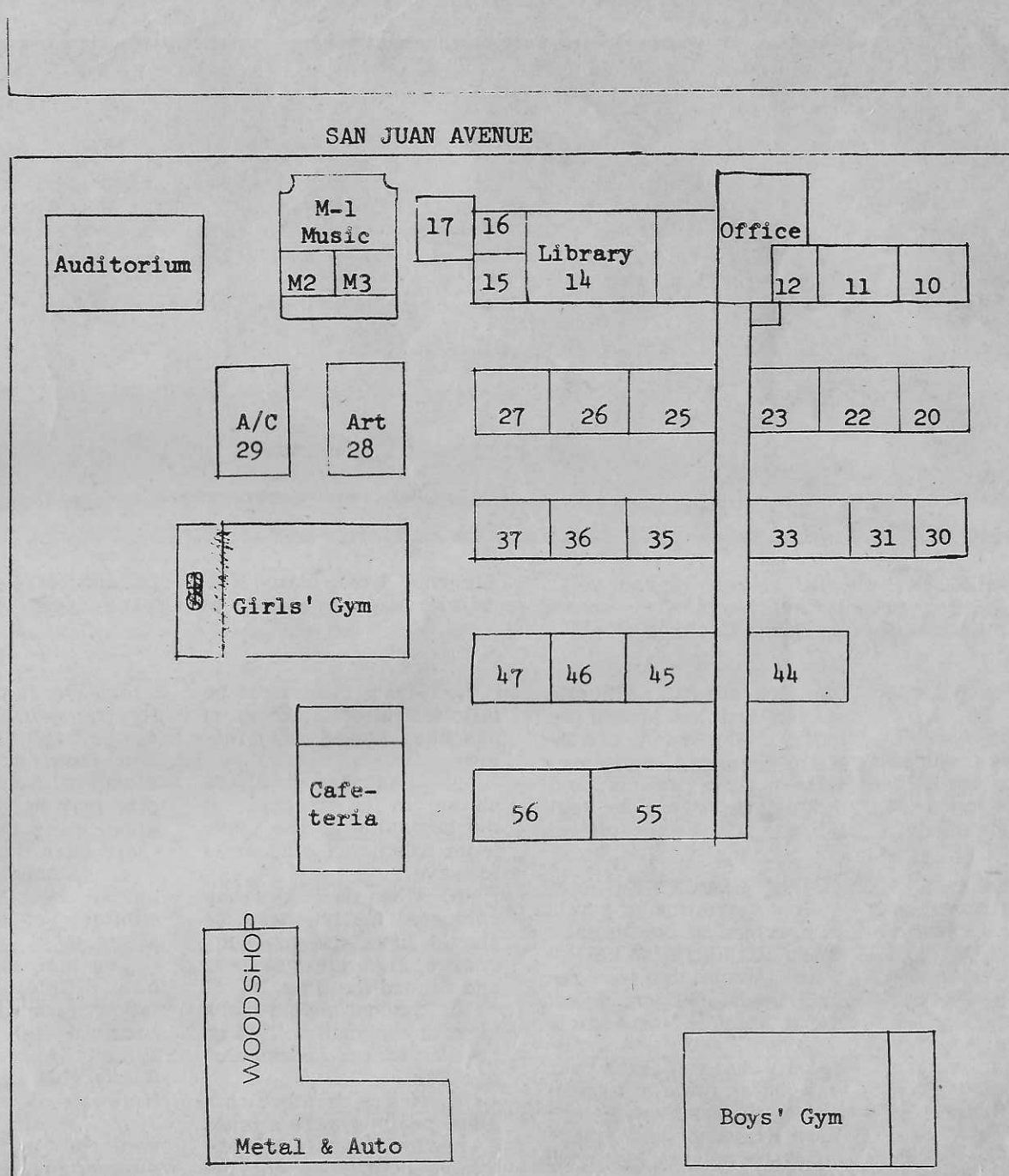

FIRE DRILL

The signal for fire drill is ten short bells rung in succession. Learn the proper exit procedures for each of your classrooms. Do not run but walk quickly. You may re-enter the building when you hear the all clear signal. Each room will have fire drill exit directions posted near the door.

GRADING SYSTEM METHODS OF GRADING

Grades are recorded as A, B, C, D, F, and Inc. A - A grade of "A" is given to the superior students who has regular attendance, is prompt, completes and hands in to the teacher all forms of written work, does more than is required of him, systematically and thoroughly prepares his work and has thoroughly mastered the subject.

B - A grade of "B" work is given to the better than average student who is regular in attendance, sometimes does more than is expected, prepares his assignments and is prompt and neat in his work. If he does have some incomplete work, it is made up promptly and shows that he has mastered the sub-

ject sufficiently for college recommendation.

C - A grade of "C" work is given to the student who is seldom absent, contributes some to stimulate the work of the class, at times raises questions of his own, takes time to get down to work, gets the fundamentals of the subject and is usually neat. He has no incomplete work and does not need to be urged to do his work, and is learning to co-operate.

D - A grade of "D" work is given to the below average student who is absent often, is sometimes late in doing his work and has consistently incomplete work. It requires the teacher to urge him to do make-up work. He finds it difficult to set down to work. A grade of "D" requires a reasonable understanding of the subject.

F - A grade of "F" work is given to the poor student who is frequently absent, is late in doing his work or does not do his work at all. The teacher must continually urge the student to get to work and show some effort. For the most part, he is uncooperative and a classroom discipline problem.

INC - This abbreviation indicates incomplete work. It is given only to students who have been doing satisfactory work but were unable to complete their

work due to forced absences or other valid reasons. The incomplete grade becomes an "F" within two weeks after the grading period unless special arrangements have been made with the office for extended time.

A student must be present 80% of the time to earn credit. The one exception to this is that days under a doctor's care can be cleared if verified. Even though a student is present 80% or more of the time his grade can be lowered at the discretion of the teacher for days missed. Note: You must be here 80% of the quarter and semester to earn credit.

THE EXETER HIGH HONOR CARD

The purpose of the Honor Card is to introduce deserving students to the principle of responsibility and self-direction in the completion of their school work. It also serves as a form of tangible recognition of scholastic achievement. Hopefully, it will grow into a program of independent study as students demonstrate their willingness to accept the responsibility given them.

To receive the Honor Card, a student must meet the qualifications and make application to the Director of Guidance, Mr. Harbin. The qualifications are:

1. To be listed on the Honor Roll for the pre-

vious grading period and to maintain satisfactory grades. A deficiency notice will be taken as evidence of unsatisfactory citizenship.

3. To have a satisfactory attendance record (no cuts, minimum number of tardies, and a minimum number of days absent).

A student holding a valid Honor Card may leave class with the permission of the instructor. Honor Card students may be in a classroom where they are not scheduled if they have the advance approval of the staff member responsible for the particular room. An Honor Card is not a permit to leave the campus. (You need a passport).

Honor Card students are expected to set an example for their fellow students by exercising good judgement in using their privileges. Honor Card students must recognize that privilege goes responsibility. Any student exercising the Honor Card privileges must have a valid Honor Card in his possession and must show it to any staff member requesting to see it. Violation of the privileges governing the Honor Card may result in the loss of privileges, either temporarily or permanently.

Honor Cards will be valid for one grading period. Eligible students must apply for this card at the beginning of each grading

period. Honor Card holders must return their card to the vice-principal if requested.

The cafeteria when not in use by a class has been designated as the place on campus where honor card holders may congregate to talk, relax, etc. The patio area north side of boys gymnasium is open. The patio area of the cafeteria is okay when cafeteria is not in use. The library can be used. The tables on the grass area west of the cafeteria can be used.

The following are rules drawn up by a committee of students and faculty of the Honor Card areas.

1. Leave all tables in neat order.
2. Leave all chairs under tables.
3. Keep the area reasonably quiet.
4. Put all trash in trash cans.

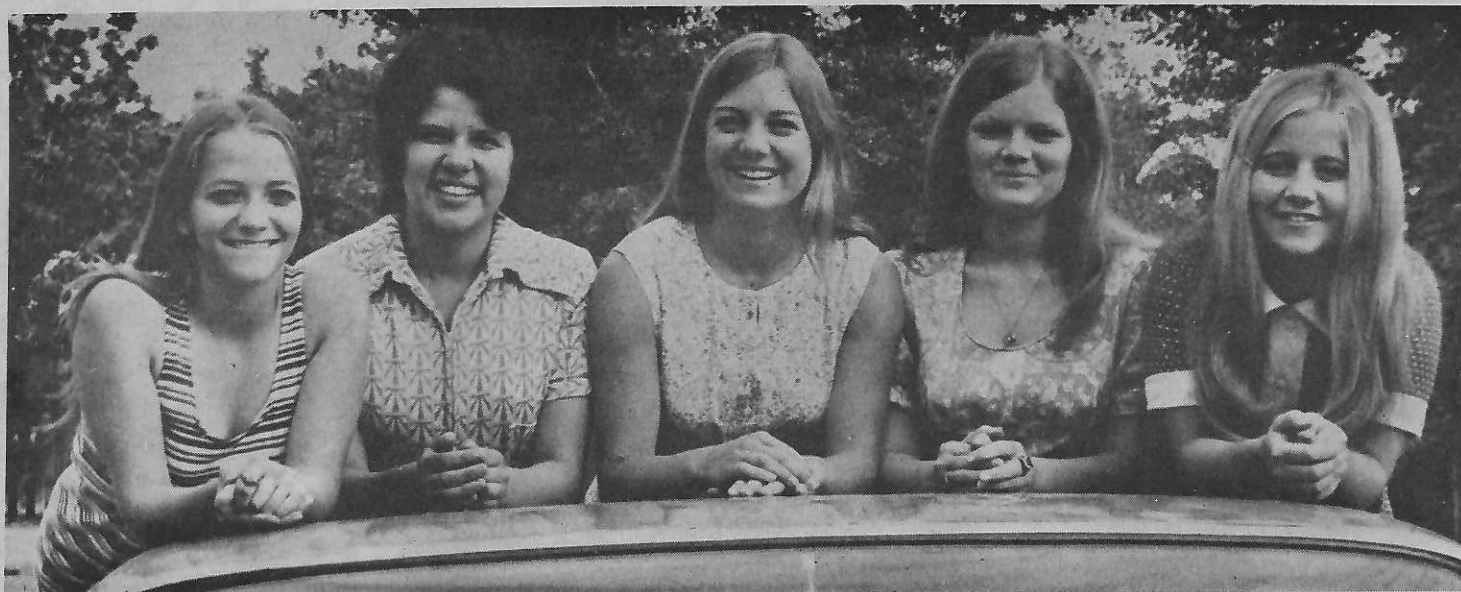
5. Do not bother or hinder classes in session.

Notes: If you lose your Honor Card, report the loss to Mr. Harbin immediately. You are responsible for your card. Do not let anyone else use it. No duplicate Honor Cards will be issued.

An Honor Card is not a late excuse or a passport.

charge who will make out an accident report. Also report it to the nurse's office. If you are injured on campus when not in a class, report at once to nurse or the main office.

INSURANCE

At the present time Exeter High School carries athletic insurance through C.I.F.P.E. (California Interscholastic Federation Protection Fund) which provides benefits for school injuries in return for the membership fee received. The C.I.F.P.E. is a non-profit school-operation organization established to assist parents in paying

this department. Owners of lost articles should inquire in this room and reclaim their missing items. Lost purses, wallets, and other jewelry will be kept in the safe in the office.

MOTOR VEHICLE POLICY

Transportation of pupils is provided by the district. The Administration recommends that you do not bring your motor vehicle to school. If it is a necessity that you drive your own motor vehicle, it must be registered with the Vice-Principal and a permission slip must be signed by your parents. Park

5. The procedure to be followed after a passport has been issued is as follows:

a. Passport should be shown to be teacher at the beginning of the class from which the student is to leave.

b. When the student has completed his business, he should have the adult in charge sign his passport and record the time.

c. Student should check in with the main office on his return and continue on to class.

d. If one or more complete periods were missed a readmit must be obtained before school the next day.

3. Pupils may use cars for transportation to school at the beginning of the day and from school at the close of the day; but pupils may not be in, on, or about their cars, or move their cars during the day.

4. Students are not to smoke or loiter within the confines of the following areas:

The main campus, football field, agriculture farm, swimming pool, and baseball fields. East of Portola Avenue, south on Rocky Hill Drive, west on Highway 65, north on San Juan Avenue, or any private or public property surrounding the school.

(These are the four rules

wooden block which is sometimes used instead of a pass slip on short errands such as a trip to the restroom or drinking fountains. About four minutes is the maximum time for this block to be out of the classroom.

ROOTERS BUS

Exeter High is proud of its teams and encourages school support at all away games as well as at home. Sign up for rooters bus starts Monday at brunch of each week the teams are traveling and ends at 12:50 on Friday.

ROOTERS BUS INFORMATION

1. A student is expected to ride the bus if his name appears on the final office rooters bus list.

2. A student will not be granted permission to ride in a private car at the time of bus departure.

3. Students will be checked by name as they board the bus at Exeter and again when they return home.

4. Safety is of paramount importance in bus travel. Students are not permitted to distract the attention of the bus driver. Students will keep their arms and hands inside the bus window.

5. If the noise and confusion is such that the safety of the bus is endangered, the bus driver will pull over to the side of the road and stop until proper order has been restored.

6. The rooter bus roster, properly noted with attendance and behavior in-

claims for services arising out of injuries which are sustained while the pupil or athlete is under direct supervision of the public school. The Board of Directors are all school men who serve without remuneration. The C.I.F. P.E. does not guarantee full payment.

LOCKERS

Each student is allowed to use a hall locker equipped with a combination lock. This locker will be loaned to the student during the first week of school. The lockers must be kept locked and the combinations are confidential. Lockers are not to be shared or changed without assignment from the office. A student will retain the same locker as long as he is a member of the student body. Periodic inspection of the lockers will be made to determine proper use. Personal articles of value must not be kept in lockers: students disregarding this direction do so at their own risk.

LEAVING SCHOOL BEFORE THE END OF THE SCHOOL TERM

Students will not be permitted to check out of school early unless they transfer to another school. No semester credit will be given to those not completing that semester.

LOST AND FOUND

For the convenience and benefit of the student, a lost and found department is maintained in Room 47A. All articles found about the school should be turned into

out by board policy. Students shall not drive a motor vehicle or sit in a car during the school hours. Upon arriving at school, park your car. The car is to remain there until the end of school.

Failure to register your motor vehicle or failure to park in a proper place will result in disciplinary action.

This year there are not assigned places. Places are taken on a first come first served basis. There is to be no student parking in the bus loading areas.

PASSES

Green pass slips must be used by students when going from the class in which they are regularly enrolled to other classes or parts of the campus. These slips must be initiated by the teachers to whom the student is going and they must sign with the time left by both teachers. These slips are to be returned to the teacher from whose room the student has been excused.

PASSPORTS

1. Passports are issued to students who must leave school during school hours.
2. Medical and Dental passports are issued by the school nurse, and should be obtained before school, brunch or lunch.
3. Special permission to leave the school grounds for any other reason must be granted by either Dean before school.
4. A note must accompany any and all requests for passports.

6. If a student becomes ill at home at noon and does not return, a phone call to the school is necessary.

7. Students leaving the school grounds (other than during the noon hour) without a passport or failing to call (as in #6) will be disciplined by the Vice-Principal.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION EXCUSES

Students seeking to be excused from taking part in Physical Education activities must bring a written excuse from home. This will excuse the student for three days only. Excuses requiring more than three days must be from your family physician. All physical Education excuses are obtained from the school nurse before school or at brunch.

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING PUPIL BEHAVIOR IN THE VICINITY OF THE EXETER UNION HIGH SCHOOL

1. Pupils must eat their lunches at school, at their home, or in established eating places. (Lunches include all food and drink). Lunches may not be eaten in cars or on private property or carried off campus.

2. City ordinances, penal and vehicle codes, and state education code laws related to loitering, trespassing, scattering litter, improper driving, parking cars, congregating, standing or walking in compact groups, trespassing on private property will be enforced.

RALLIES

Game rallies are generally held in the boys gym or on the lawn in front of the Chemistry laboratory on the Friday preceding an athletic contest and help to build up enthusiasm and spirit for the school and the team. It is the sincere hope of the student body that this spirit not only will help us to build good athletic teams, but also will permeate the entire school organization, so that students in all phases of school life will have the desire to aid in building an excellent educational system.

READMITS

Any student absent for a whole or part of a day must bring a note from his parent or guardian and obtain a "readmit to class" card. This card must be signed by all teachers of the classes missed. If the readmit card is lost or misplaced and a duplicate is issued, one detention is given.

A student returning to school without a note will be given detentions that must be served until the note is received.

RESPONSIBILITY OF SCHOOL

Every teacher in the public schools shall hold pupils to a strict account for their conduct on the way to and from school, on the playgrounds, or during recess.

7. Students may be assigned seats if sponsor feels assigned seats are necessary for certain students.

8. Any show of misconduct, or at the other school on the part of any of our students should be dealt with accordingly. The sponsor has a responsibility to help students grow up and stay out of trouble.

10. When returning to Exeter, students have the opportunity to telephone their parents, as a public telephone is located near the brunch stand and pool area for this purpose.

SCHOOL NURSE

The aim of the school nurse is to prevent the development or spread of contagion among the students, to detect defects of sight or hearing and administer to minor health needs as well as to give first aid. Her office is located down the hall from the main office.

STUDENT BODY CARDS

The price of the Associated Student Body Card is \$8.50 and it entitles the holder to admission to all sporting events, to participate in all extra-curricular activities and to receive his "Acta" (upon payment of the balance in the spring). Revenue from the sale of Student Body Cards is used to finance all student body activities and provide such things as uniforms and playing equipment for our teams. Lost membership cards may be replaced for 50¢

FINANCES

Each student organization should elect a treasurer who will have the responsibility of handling the financial matters of the group. The treasurer should keep a complete record of all receipts and expenses and should confer with the club advisor as often as necessary to keep the organization's books in order.

All purchases made by a student organization must be authorized first by a Purchase Order. These orders may be obtained from the bottom row of the teachers' mailboxes or the office secretaries and must be countersigned by the organization's advisor and the Principal. All disbursements from the general student body fund must be approved by the Student Council. All checks must be signed by either the Principal or the Superintendent. Periodically a statement of finances will be given to the advisor.

SUSPENSION POLICY

The student is to remain home for the duration of suspension. The student cannot attend or participate in extra-curricular activities.

TELEPHONE

If through accident or other causes and unnecessary damage occurs to a book, a fine commensurate with the damages will be assessed. Grades will be given only after all books have been paid for or returned.

VISITORS TO EUHS

There are to be no campus visitors to EUHS during school hours.

WELFARE LOAN FUND

A revolving loan fund is available in the Principal's office to accommodate students who need to borrow money for an emergency. You are expected to repay these loans promptly.

School Athletes Code Of Conduct

Participation in athletics means more than competition between two individuals on two teams representing different high schools. It teaches fair play and sportsmanship; understanding and appreciation of teamwork; the fact that quitting means failure while hard work means success.

With these goals in mind, a committee of athletes, coaches, and administra-

tors have worked together to formulate this guide for the use of all concerned.

The conduct of an athlete is closely observed in many areas of life. It is important that this behavior be above reproach in all the following areas:

On the field:

In the area of athletic competition a real athlete doesn't use profanity or illegal tactics. He learns the fact that losing is part of the game, and that he should be gracious in defeat and modest in victory. It is always courteous to congratulate the opponent on a well-played game after the contest. However, if there is nothing good to say to your opponent, leave the field rapidly. False athletes often display fits of temper, clown, etc., when things fail to go as

desired or when replaced by a teammate. A true athlete has complete control of himself at all times. Officials in a game are there for the purpose of insuring that both teams will receive a fair deal. Officials do not lose a game for you. It is athletic tradition and rule, that no one except the appointed captain talks to the officials. He should speak in a tone of respect and for the purpose of clarifying a rule.

Any behavior contrary to that, which has been stated, is a direct reflection on the school, team and coaches and will not be tolerated. Violations will result in possible removal from the game, suspension or expulsion from the team.

In the classroom:

A good athlete is a good student. He plans his time so that he gives sufficient energy to his studies to insure acceptable grades.

School regulations require the following academic standards for eligibility:

1. Student carrying seven classes should pass four of the seven.

In addition to maintaining satisfactory grades, an athlete should give respectful attention to classroom activities and show respect for students and faculty members at all times. Horse play and unnecessary talking are not approved habits of behavior. If these standards present a problem that the athlete is unable to correct, he may be suspended from

opportunity.

Violations of these rules may result in suspension and possible expulsion from the team. Don't let you team down.

On trips:

On trips, athletes directly represent the community, school, and coaches. Therefore, it is expected that all concerned will dress in an acceptable manner in keeping with this code. Violations in this area will result in suspension from the next game.

Miscellaneous subjects:

1. Working athletes must comply with the code. An athlete who works must: a) Maintain academic standards; b) maintain training rules (especially late-hour rules); c) not let work interfere with practice or games; d) learn to put his team's welfare first.

2. School equipment: a) An athlete is financially responsible for all equipment checked out to him; b) he will receive credit on item turned in only if they are items that were checked out to him; c) he must treat all equipment as though it were his own personal property--it should be kept in a locked locker; d) all clothing must be washed at least once a week.

3. Any athlete dropping the team after the first contest will: a) Forfeit his award; b) not be allowed to participate in any other sport until the season of the sport which he has dropped is completed.

4. Practice regulations:

"Competing for Exeter Union High School is not compulsory but rather is a privilege. Don't abuse it!"

Smoking, drinking or drugs:

No boy or girl who uses or possesses tobacco, alcoholic beverage or drugs will be allowed to represent Exeter Union High School in any athletic contest.

All other events:

Any group representing Exeter Union High School will be expected to refrain from smoking or drinking during the activity. This will be interpreted to mean from the time the group leaves Exeter until it returns.

Extra curricular:

Anything that is not actual classroom instruction during the regular day is classified as extra curricular:

1. All athletics other than P.E. classes.

2. All musical productions: a) Parades; b) pep bands; c) concerts; d) trips.

3. All speech and drama productions.

4. All F.F.A. contests.

5. Any group representing Exeter Union High School including rooters busses and spectator groups.

Violation of this ruling will be handled as follows:

1. First violation: a) ineligible for all extra curriculars for a period of nine weeks from the date of the offense. At that time the Athletic Board will rule on the case upon the request

5. Students wishing to participate in spring sports, who are not out for winter sports, may start organized practice with their coach January 31, 1971.

6. Players failing to give their entire support to the team or squad at any, or all times during the season shall forfeit all claims earned in that sport for that season.

7. An athlete may not be a member of more than one organized team at a time.

8. It is the policy of Exeter Union High School that athletes, having once been chosen as squad member, do not quit their team mates or coaches. If their conduct or lack of co-operation is such that they become undesirable members of the squad, they will be dropped. A student will be given two weeks or until the first game which ever comes first, to try out without penalty.

9. The athletic department discourages those individuals that do not want to abide by the training

finest protection and uniforms. This can only be done with 100% co-operation. School equipment is to be worn by the proper party only at athletic contests and practices, not at home, on weekends, or by girl friends.

11. Athletes participating in any contest are to go and return under the supervision of the school.



A healthy athlete should have a good attendance record. He should never be truant from classes or school. If he is truant, the penalty will be exclusion from participation in the next game. Missing more than two periods on the day of a game automatically makes a player ineligible for the game. What kind of an athlete would be truant, thus placing his own enjoyment above the welfare of the team?

On the campus:

Behavior and appearance on the campus is of great importance. Athletes should be leaders, since fellow students respect and follow them. There are certain marks that pertain to athletes. The athlete is:

1. Neat and well-groomed at all times.
2. Possess a neat appearing hair cut.
3. Never profane in his speech.
4. Clean shaven.

Real leaders will accept these responsibilities, realizing that they influence many others on the campus. Athletic leaders work for the betterment of the school and what is right and good for their fellow students. Exhibitionism (display of affection) with girls in public is in poor taste and makes a girl look cheap; it also places the athlete below socially accepted standards. Hazing of new students, fighting, etc., are certainly not in the best interest of school spirit and should be opposed vigorously at every

1. A coach must be consulted if any athlete must miss a practice. An athlete missing a practice or a game without good reason may lose his letter; b) illness or an extreme emergency would be a good reason for missing practice or a game; c) obey the specific practice rules of the coach.

5. Good locker room procedure: a) Roughhousing, throwing towels or other objects is dangerous and will not be allowed in the shower room; b) only one towel may be used; c) all showers must be turned off--the last person to leave the shower room should check all showers; d) proper respect must be given to all adults and team managers.

6. School spirit: a) An athlete should think of his school rather than his personal interest; b) he should participate in some sport where his presence will help the team even though he is not a star; c) each athlete should furnish spectator and rooter support for sports in which he is not participating.

TRAINING RULES AND DISCIPLINE

The students of Exeter are proud of their athletic teams. To maintain this widely known reputation among our competing schools for fair play and sportsmanship, the following rules and penalties have been adopted by students, teachers, and administration of Exeter Union High School.

shall be dropped from the activity until the student requests an Athletic Board hearing be held for poor attendance (ditching, truancy), poor citizenship, and/or not following rules or other standards such as failure to co-operate.

2. Second violation: a) ineligible for one year from the date of the offense. An Athletic Board hearing will then be held at the student's request.

Athletic Board:

The Athletic Board of Exeter Union High School shall meet upon the request of a student to determine eligibility status and other Athletic problems and shall be composed of the following people:

1. Teacher or coach involved.
2. Athletic Director.
3. Superintendent.
4. Dean (either boys or girls depending on the case involved).
5. Appointee of student council.

General training rules:

1. Training rules apply the year around.
2. Violations are to be reported to the athletic director.
3. If a student is guilty of a violation and ineligible but asks his individual coach if he can help the coach in any possible way, it is permissible of the coach to allow the boy to help out.
4. Students wishing to participate in winter sports who are not out for fall sports may start organized practice with their coach

There were many special highlights for the year just passed.

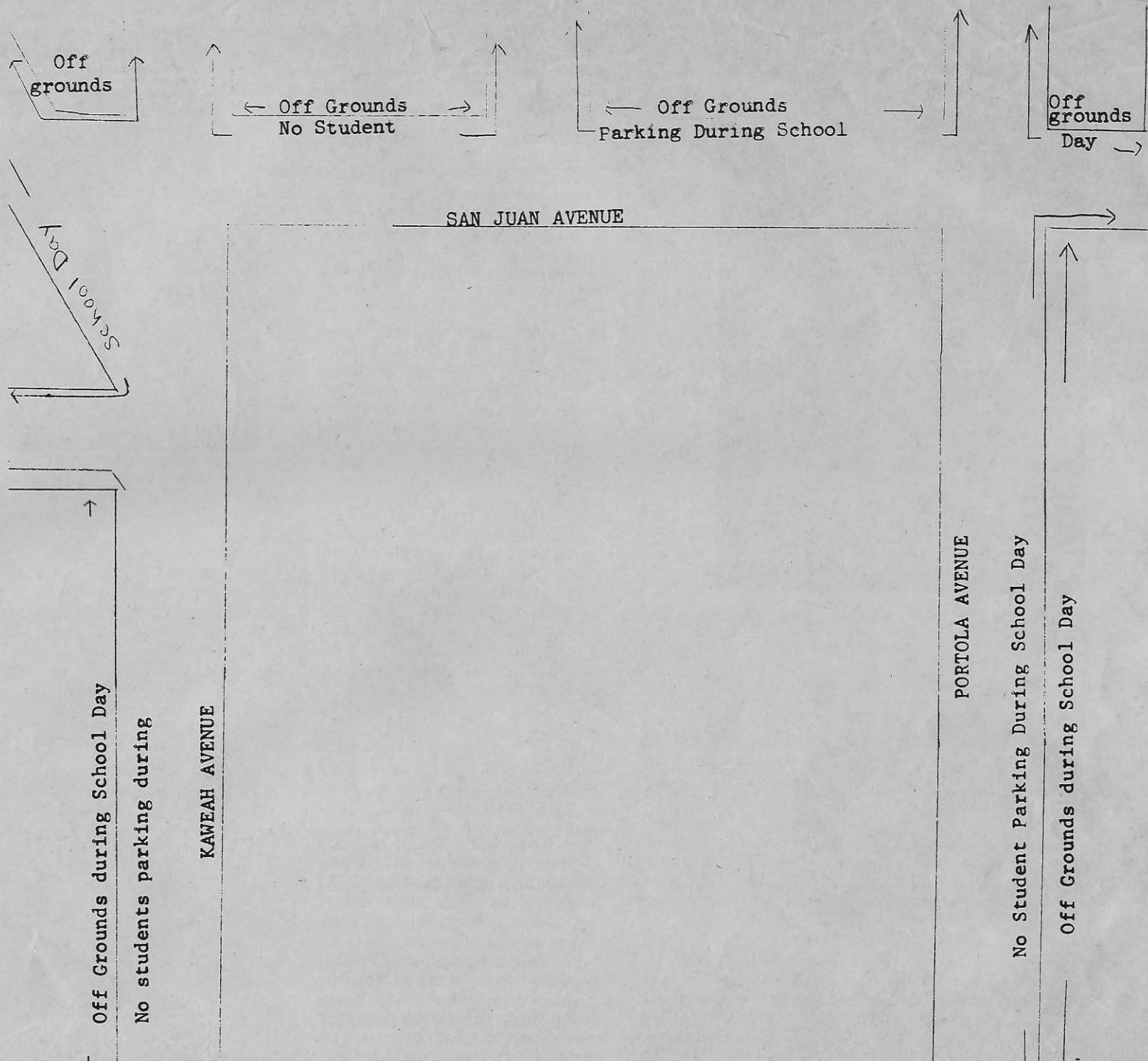
The varsity football team won eleven while losing none. They won the division playoff 3 to 0 in the rain against a rugged Riverdale team.

The basketball team finished fourth in the valley playoffs, losing to the number one rated team in the valley by just two points.

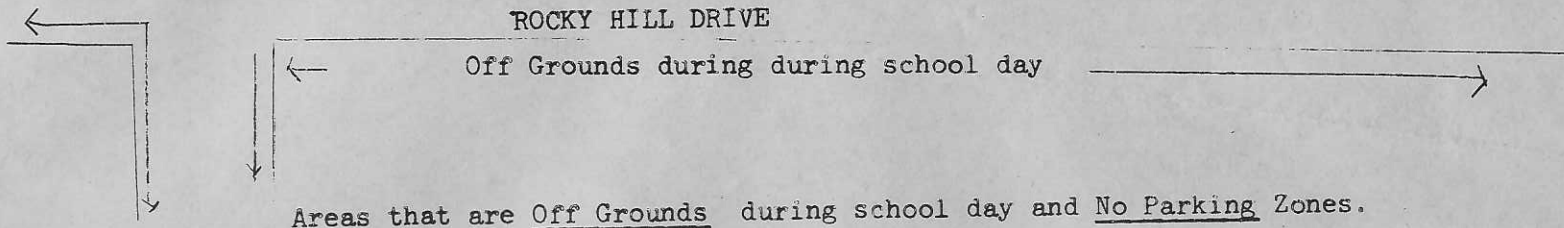
Individually the Monarchs won many honors.

Any valid P.E. excuse from the nurse will mean that the individual CANNOT participate in inter-scholastic sports, practice or game situations.

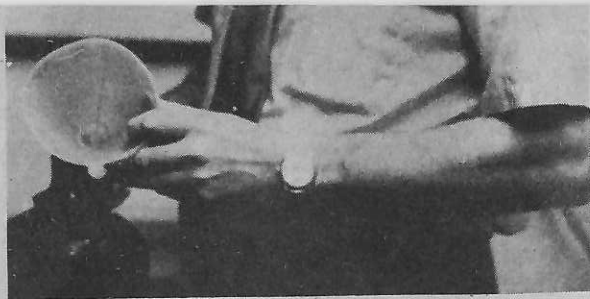
Failure to comply with the above policy will result in a five-school-day ineligibility for either practice or competition.

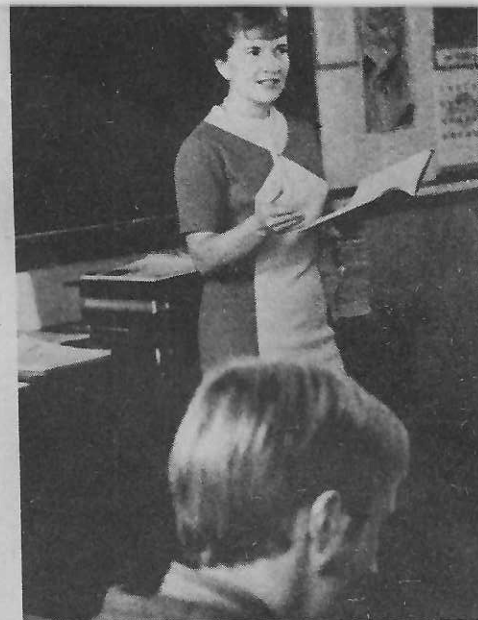
